July 15 Monday  
Bro<sup>r</sup> Taylor working & copying and translating; Pedard helping. Bro<sup>r</sup> Taylor preached in his own room to three persons - Pedard and two others. I translated for Pedard. He had given out the last evening of the disruption that on Monday evening he would prove the book of Mormon true by the Bible. Only two came - both tractant presns at Boulogne.

Tuesday July 16  
The two strangers came again this evening and spent several hours with us. one is a English sea Captain of a Brig (since baptised) and a Mr Morton of London, a merchant. And they spent Wednesday evening with us also. Commenced at 6 o'clock and continue proof til 7 P.M. with scarce a moments respite. On just the evening with Dr. Bell in company with Dr<sup>r</sup> Taylor & Jack. Mr<sup>r</sup> Morton and Mr<sup>r</sup> Pedard. With a full heart I bid farewell to Dr<sup>r</sup> Jack who is to remain at B. left Boulogne at 7 A.M. for Paris. Mr<sup>r</sup> Pedard left for Havre and had to go part the way with us to Paris. Arrived at Paris at half past three P.M. soon found Dr<sup>r</sup> Tracy and Wagner. Hired a carriage and rode across the city to the neighborhood of the Luxembourg Palace and garden (open to the public) where after hunting for a couple of hours we found two rooms at fifty francs a month. But as the terms will not be vacant till tomorrow. We went to rue de la Ferme No 1 directly opposite where my Brother F Jackson Bolton and I used to live with Madame Weston. The house we stod in is the most notorious house for the resort of the Devils in all Europe. STRANGE. Took supper and retired in the legend about 9 o'clock. Then lounged in the garden of the Luxembourg till one o'clock. Then went and took respiration of our room. Rue de l'Orangerie No 1. Severe.

Our host's behaving in a racially manner, we changed our quarters to Rue de Tournon No 7. I now spend my days thus - rise at 6 - commence translating the book of Mormon at 7 - pray at 7 1/2 past 8 and sing. Then go to breakfast (7 1/2 a bowl of bread and milk) Then translate till three. Then dinner (a plate of vegetables and then a plate of meat and vegetables 15 sous) Then translate till 8 P.M. Then walk in the garden for an hour. Then bread and sugar water and cheese. then singing, prayers and bed.

Mr<sup>r</sup> John Taylor is writing a pamphlet of his Boulogne disruption to be published in England. Mr<sup>r</sup> Howell (William) visiting the English about town. Mr<sup>r</sup> Fred Piercy sketching a lithographic sketch of Mr<sup>r</sup> Taylor for the pamphlet. Mr<sup>r</sup> Arthur Stauner copying after Mr<sup>r</sup> Taylor.

Sunday September 1<sup>st</sup>

20<sup>th</sup> Friday  
Fred Piercy left for London having finished Elder Taylors two sketches. and on the 6<sup>th</sup> Elder Taylor left for England to publish his pamphlet. Wagner left with him. Mr<sup>r</sup> Pedard arrived a few minutes after Elder Taylor left. Elder Taylor returned having published his pamphlet and had a bust of Joseph and Hyrum made.

Mr<sup>r</sup> Taylor Mr<sup>r</sup> Howell and I spent a day at St. Cloud to see the great waters there. Most grand view magnificent stupendous. Mr<sup>r</sup> Howell left France and returned to his family. he's a squirt. Mr<sup>r</sup> Pedard and Brother Taylor left this second time for England. He had written a pamphlet and Mr<sup>r</sup> Pedard and I translated it into French entitled "Amis de la vérité" and left me to see to the printing and I was to forward one or two to him but I could not on account of the stupid Post Office arrangements with England. I became acquainted with Jean Baptiste Wilhelm about this time. He was for fifteen years a Jesuite and he was also a Priest of the A.C. Church. But left them because he found their principles opposed to the happiness of the human family. Mr<sup>r</sup> Pedard left for Havre has spent the most of the day with me every day since he came. I forwarded 300 pamphlets "Amis de la vérité" to Mr<sup>r</sup> Taylor at Jersey Island. For some time past I have had frequent calls of persons enquiring after our doctrines. But I find them all denying the personal reign of Christ upon the Earth and unbelieving in the Bible.

rejecting all but a few passages that pleases them. Orange trees taken up out of the garden for the winter. Had a visit from 2 "Scorians" this evening. 2 of them Editors of their newspaper. Scorians are communists. Cable followers - for over two weeks I have been living on bread alone. As Brother Taylor left me almost penniless expecting to return in a few days. I wrote some days ago to Bro' Pack who is in England gathering means for him and me. and represented to him the strait I was in. But he sent word back "The post office clerk would not promise that money should come safe in a letter." so he left me to get along or not just as it happened. But thanks to my Father in heaven an unknown person signing "a sister" sent me a gold piece worth 12 francs. But it goes like the wind as I have wood, candles warm and all the little expenses to pay for Candles 30 sous a pound. Wood 70 sous for 100 pounds. And as I have calls every evening almost I am forced to have candles and fire. Through through the day I walk the streets to try to get warm. I have but two francs left now. A gentleman called yesterday who is marshall to the Chamber of Representatives. He was well pleased and he says he preaches every where. Spent Sunday evening with M<sup>r</sup> Jaurès received today 125 francs from Brother Taylor, money given him for me by Bro' Pack I went and had a warm dinner. I find living on bread alone is not calculated for my constitution. I became incapable of action. I could not sit to translate. Br' Taylor arrived having with him a Br' Philip Le la Mare an elder, about 26 years old, able to support himself. Has a wife and five children. His home is on the Island of Jersey. He speaks French and English very imperfectly. Up to this time neither Br' Taylor nor I had felt to preach much, nor to be in any hurry to begin the church. But this time as soon as he arrived he said the time had come to begin to work. I had three persons ready for baptism now Editor of a Communist Newspaper; named Bertrand and Wilhelm and his wife. When Br' Taylor asked them, they told him as they had told me that they were ready. M<sup>r</sup> and M<sup>r</sup> Jaurès and their son 9 years old also ready. We have been hunting for many days to find a place to baptize without success. Every body says the police will interfere if we undertake to baptise in the river on account of the health of the people. Went to Pecard to come if he wished to be baptised among the first fruits of France. No one can conceive the difficulties we have to contend with in relation to baptising. The swimming baths are taken to pieces. There are no paths either up nor down the river. Br' Taylor and Delaill - went to day a boat to St. Omer but could find no place whatever. Had a visit this evening from M<sup>r</sup> Bertrand Wilhelm and Pecard were present. This Philosopher is a fool or a booby filled with ambitions to drive out the only thing that was in it and so I told him plainly and bluntly Br' Taylor arrived late and tired and said but little.

Held a short council last evening, and it was decided that Br' Delaill and M<sup>r</sup> Jaurès go ahead and pick out a place down the river, on an island called Lile St. Omer, where baptism could be performed in the Seine River. The island being represented as a little, wooded, retired place of only three or four families at St. Omer according to appointment M<sup>r</sup> Pecard (who arrived last wednesday from Havre) and M<sup>r</sup> Wilhelm came to the room. Then to our most utter astonishment Mr. Pecard said he was not yet ready. We invited him to go with us however so we four started at 20 minutes past 11 o'clock and proceeded to Barrière Ronsonière. We all then proceeded a N.W. course about three miles to the "le St. Omer" where we arrived about two block full. Where we found the rest. After reposing a while and eating a mouthful we all walked around a portion of the "ile" to see a place I had been to look at while they were eating. It was chosen

- December - 1 - It is on the west side near a mill, and a few yards inland is a deep, small hollow just the thing for a dredging place. We having obtained the use of a room in the Miller's house, close by, who are remarkably fine people; for himself, wife and son to dredge in. Bellard was in a bad quandary. At about half past three Br<sup>t</sup> Taylor called us all together in the hollow, where Br<sup>t</sup> Taylor asked those desiring baptism, whether they were determined to forsake sin and keep the commandments of God. I translated it into French and they usually answered they were so resolved. We then had Prayers in French Br<sup>t</sup>'s all mouth. A quarter of an hour was then spent in getting ready. We then met on the bank of the river Seine. Br<sup>t</sup> Taylor entered the river and called for the eldest man. Wilhelm stepped forward. Then Br<sup>t</sup> Taylor said in French (calling the person by their first name) For l'autorite au nom de Dieu par Jesus Christ je vous baptise pour la remission de vos pechez au nom du Père et du Fils et du Saint Esprit. Then he then baptised Mr. Wilhelm, Bertrand & James and his wife and son. After dredging we reassembled at the Ferry house, partook of a slight collation and at dark started for Paris. There is a restaurant and had dinner. Then all assembled at Br<sup>t</sup> Squires. Where the ordinance of laying on hands was attended to. by Br<sup>t</sup> Squires and Br<sup>t</sup> L. Br<sup>t</sup> T called on Br<sup>t</sup> L to speak a little, and then he did me at first. Then he spoke and I translated. Then Br<sup>t</sup> T gave liberty to others. Br<sup>t</sup> Wilhelm and Bertrand spoke. Then Br<sup>t</sup> T spoke again I translating. We then had singing and dismissed by prayer by Br<sup>t</sup> L. After which we partook of supper provided by Br<sup>t</sup> Squires. And having agreed to meet again on Wednesday evening we separated. - the happiest people in Paris.
- Sunday - 2 - Br<sup>t</sup> Taylor wrote to Br<sup>t</sup> Jack saying he would organise the church here in Paris on Sunday next, and invited him to be present. Richard still spends much of his time with us every day. He is waiting for God to tell him where to personally to be baptised. Br<sup>t</sup> Taylor has several times told him in the name of the Lord.
- Wednesday - 4 - Held a meeting this evening in our own room. All the brethren and sister present and Mr<sup>r</sup> Wilhelm. Meeting opened by having prayer and singing. Br<sup>t</sup> Taylor then called on me to speak. I did so in French. Then I desired him to speak and he did so and I translated. Sung several hymns Benediction and separated at a late hour.
- Thursday - 5 - This evening at four Br<sup>t</sup> T and I went to Br<sup>t</sup> Wilhelm's house. Br<sup>t</sup> Taylor baptised his wife in a large bath tub, he standing in the water in the bath with her. Prayers, covenant etc as usual. After which we eat dinner with them and sung much in the evening. Br<sup>t</sup> T. wrote a pretty little song in a few minutes on a German air. The subject is "Truth is eternal".
- Sunday - 8 - Brother Jack having arrived last evening. He met with us this evening in company with all the brethren and sisters. Friend of the brother Charles John Taylor; & the Treasurer of their Friends C. C. Section; one of the presidents of Seventies. John Failes; William, Philip, & La More; Beacon James Wilson; the recently baptised brethren and sisters Mr. Bellard and a Mr. Bellanger. The meeting was opened in the usual form. Br<sup>t</sup> Taylor said the time had come to organize the church here: he gave us some instruction. Did the nominations ought to be voted upon by the branch; all which I translated. Br<sup>t</sup> Wilhelm was then nominated for the eldership by Mr. Taylor vote unanimous. After I then nominated Br<sup>t</sup> Bertrand to be a Trust. vote unanimous each also voting for themselves. These bretha were then called upon to express their feelings whether they were willing to accept their nomination. They both spoke very well acceptance. These brother were then ordained under the hands of the Elders present. Br<sup>t</sup> Taylor mouth and I interpreting. Br<sup>t</sup> Taylor then requested me to preach in French. I did so. After which we sang psalms and were dismissed.
- Then Mr. Bellanger put many questions to Elder T and finally offered himself for baptism. And thus ended the evening.
- Wednesday - 11 - Meeting - 3 strangers. Br<sup>t</sup> Jack returned to Calais Tuesday morning. I bought an over and a frock coat which I needed very much paid for 220 and 270 francs. Mr. La More is very sick he is confined to his bed. Typhoid fever.
- Sabbath - 12 - Br<sup>t</sup> S. L. M. very low. Mr. Bellard left Thursday. He has not a good spirit.

- 1850 Br Bellanger (Pierre Jidors) came at 8 according to appointment. And he Br Taylor and myself went to l' Isle St Ouen where Br Taylor baptised him.
- At the evening meeting Br Bellanger was confirmed. Br Taylor preached in French. At the wednesday meeting 2 strangers present. Preached in French.
- Thursday 19 Br Taylor left for England at 7 past 11 it'll be to find the belliedous. Br De la M is still very low. Had him brought into Br's room which is my room also so that I could see to him all the time day and night.
- Sabbath 25 At greeting I caught a very very very heavy cold - we pre. sat in the draft. Wednesday CHRISTMAS. 3 young men present at our meeting. one a nephew of Cabot's. I preached for an hour in French. In fact all my preaching teaching & praying & claiming the is in french. They were well pleased and enquired much afterwards of Dr Dall's getting well. Br Bellanger came and offered his services to the church in any capacity the church would give. He had just been deprived of his place by old Cabot's agent here for some trivial affair.
- Sabbath 29 After several days I have been heavily sick with cold on my lungs I cough terribly. Br Bellanger sent on a mission to his native village "Departement de Savoie" a 4yo man. I then never that he be ordained a Priest see Star's man. Then aided by Elder Wilhelm. I ordained him and set him apart for his mission and after gave him much instruction. It is well to state that we partake of the sacrament every sabbath evening.
- Mondays 30 I dined this evening with Mr Vanlentrouck and family. a most affectionate family to each other. They think of going to the valley. Br Dall in recruiting fast. I am getting well again. But it has been a severe pull on me.
- Wednesday January 1 Our meeting was rather slim, but very agreeable. The Spirit of the Lord was greatly with us. I preached in French. I ought to state that for some time back I have been revising the translation of the Book of Mormon with Dr. Wilhelm every day from 7 past 5 to 6. But his is full of a proud contemptuous spirit, overbearing - that we professed most wearisomely slow.
- Thursday 1 - 2 Took a long walk with Mr Vanlentrouck and his daughter Mathilde. it being as mild clear and charming a day as mid April. We happened in front of the "Ecluse" just as Louis Napoleon Bonaparte came out on horseback. He is a coarse common place looking man. He passed a few feet from us on a walk. A few isolated cries of "vive Napoleon" were uttered among the crowd who has collected. From thence we walked up the long avenue of the Wilson Fields to the triumphal arch of Napoleon the Great, and then returned home arrived at 5.
- Tuesday 11 - This evening Br Taylor arrived from England, and put into my hand the first and only letter I have received from home since I left. The news it contains filled me with most bitter anguish. I rushed from the house without my coat, and walked in the cold night till towards morning. I prayed all the time that I might not lose my reason. The Lord had shown me all this in the time of it. And I told Elder Taylor of it long ago. But at that time he said it was impossible and tried to cheer. That G. would not permit it.
- Wednesday 12 - On agony - On agony - what I now suffer!!!
- 13 - To my utter astonishment Elder Taylor called on me to preach this evening for I was in no fit condition to preach. I spoke about 20 Minutes and was greatly blessed of the Lord. His Spirit came down upon me and I felt like a new creature. There were 15 persons present this evening. And all were much pleased. Br T. & W both spoke after me.
- Sunday February 9 - Br Dorey now arrived from Italy this morning. Brought him to me lodgings and met with us this evening.
- 10 - Br Taylor, now D.L. and myself went to Versailles and visited the Chateau and grounds, and the two Trianons. The Palace is the most splendid of Europe.
- 11 - Br Taylor left for Havre to day. on his way to England.
- 12 - Br Taylor had been preparing for some time back to return this spring to the Valley. He has been writing a book the proceeds of which were to be

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go to the support of the french mission. I have been copying after him and Br' J. L. after me. But a few words in the last general article from the Valley has determined him to remain another year. I have also been translating at the same time with Br' Wilhelm the book of Mormon every afternoon. So that I don't lack for work.

Tuesday  
Feb 18

Asternay the "Journal des Debats" published a translation of the fourth general article accompanied with some most excellent remarks. We were visited today by a manufacturer of sugar from the sugar beet, who is desirous to go to the Valley. Br' J. L. and Wilhelm visited a protestant religious meeting this evening, and spoke some to them.

Wednesday  
19

Br' Taylor had about dreamt about Br' Back last night. This evening a vote was called whether to take a public hall or no. Br' and Sister Wilhelm voted against; though all the rest voted for, strangers and all. Wilhelm afterwards manifested a very bad spirit and his wife worse still. He said he would not preach as we had lost all confidence in him. Though neither Br' J nor myself had ever heard such a thing even to each other. Wilhelm had written a pamphlet full of errors and was vexed because we would not mention the contents. He told Br' Taylor he knew more than the Whole of us. He has a most unfortunate idea of his own learning and consequence.

Saturday  
22

Br' J. L. received letters from Liverpool requiring his immediate presence. He left here for Liverpool by the 12 part 11 Still train, leaving me with nine teen sous (same value as a cent nearly). He had near twenty pounds. I had to borrow five pounds of Br' J. L. (who has grown fat as a pig).

Sabbath  
- 23 -

Some 3 or 8 strangers present at our meeting this evening. All very well pleased except a protestant who had been qualified to be a whole and needed not a physician. Had considerable talk after meeting unusual.

Monday  
24

Br' J. L. and I visited the "Place de la Bastille" there were at least fifty thousand people there, bringing wreaths to the "Column of July" which was raised on the spot where the old "Bastile" stood. To day is the anniversary of the last revolution. The column was raised in honor of those who died for liberty. From thence we went to "l'Ere la Chaise". Where of course we visited the tomb of abbé Guillois and Madame ~~Guillotin~~. Returned home about 2 P.M. Worked a little while with Br' Wilhelm. When suddenly he turned himself about and commenced accusing me of preaching false doctrines in a most haughty arrogant manner. He was full of the Devil as an egg of meat. Br' Edmari told him so. He says baptism of sins must be obtained before baptism by water etc &c. says that there is an invisible church composed in part of all the holy men members of all manner of religions and creeds, but who are trying to serve God the best they knew how. And that they form the soul of the Body, the Lamb's wife<sup>4</sup> and that our church is only the Body. After about an hour's railing using most insolent language finding I remained apparently calm, but would not be dictated to; He finally cooled off, sat down, and after a little began to ask questions. Then I opened his mind to principles he had never dreamed of. And at 6 he left apparently content, calm and with a good spirit.

Tuesday

- 25 -

Br' J. L. left here this evening for his house intending to go first to Mans

to spend a few days with Br' Bellanger.

- 27 -

Wilhelm did not come to meeting this evening. I had all to do. All went well. Wilhelm came today about 2 P.M. And brought all the books and papers belonging to us, and said he could walk no longer with us. Denied our right to cut him off from the church. Said he desired us to take the priesthood from him and tried his best to get into a quarrel with me. But as this step of his was fully expected by me, I could not be induced to speak much. And finally he went away but not until I had borne him a faithful testimony. So the work of revision has ceased.

Wrote to Eld' J about Wilhelm's conduct.

**Mardi Gras.** At 2 PM went to walk with Mr. Vanlenbrouck to see mardi Gras. Went to place Carrousel, thence to the Macdaine house to the "Elysée" where Louis Napoleon lives. There we saw the fat by procession. The ox was turned off with ribands. He was not what we would fat in the Valley. Though they pretended he weighed two thousand eight hundred and sixty four pounds (French). There followed after the ox about 30 persons on horses members of a circus company. These were dressed mostly as Spaniards. Then followed a char drawn by four horses well turned off. On a raised place in the center of the char sat a beautiful woman plainly dressed holding a sickle in her hand. She was intended to represent the Goddess "Ceres". She was surrounded by her maidens holding in their hands various products of the soil. These were all richly dressed. Then followed a few more men fancifully dressed and riding on horses. From here we went on to the Boulevards and walked nearly the whole length without seeing scarce a masked person. This was formerly a great day in France and in fact in all Roman Catholic Countries. In Paris thousands on thousands would dress in all manner of fantastic dresses and meet at the Palais Royal and form a line and parade in order the whole length of the Boulevards and one or two other streets. When I was in Paris in 1832 or 3 there was truly a most brilliant display. But this year all was dead - no life, no energy, no vivacity. but every body had a melancholy gloomy look. The only thing worth seeing was a light wagon and the four persons in it. They were dressed as east-india islanders. Their dresses and parades were indeed brilliant. One of them was of Peacock's tail feathers. I dined today with Mr. Vanlenbrouck.

**Saturday** Wilhelm came to claim wages for revising B of Mormon. He has revised in all 85 Pages. and has received one hundred francs. And wants five hours Sterling or one hundred and fifty francs more. At that rate the Book of M. would cost something by the time it is finished. He stayed but a few moments. The man relating to sugar making in the Valley called at 5 and gave me a proforma up for Br. Taylor giving details of all things needful and probable cost. I sat up late and translated them and wrote a letter and inclosed them to old Taylor at Eton.

**Monday** Pleasant meeting three strangers present last evening  
10 of young Man called today to offer his services to the church. I told him to come and see what he could do with revising the translation of the Book of Mormon. He is a fine looking young man well educated.

**Tuesday** Snow last night but it melted nearly as fast as it fell. The young man 11 came today and we commenced reading over Wilhelm's translation. He remained till 3. went home sick with "a gripe" an influenza of which it is said 300,000 Persons have it now in Paris.

The young man has not been here since the first day. the 11 inst. It has rained the most of the time the past week. I am very very lonesome I dream much of home. I saw my wife putting on a new silk (white) dress and another time I saw her nursing an infant and saw the milk run from her breast. I received a letter this morning from Br. Taylor inclosing one for Wilhelm of which the following is a copy.

"Liverpool March 12. 1851. Br. Wilhelm I received your letter and as I have not your address shall be obliged to enclose my reply in me to Mr. Bellon. I am sorry that difficulties of the kind you mentioned should have taken place between you and him. such things are very unpleasant between Brethren. You charge him with teaching doctrines contrary to the Bible, the Book of Mormon, and the Doctrine and Covenants." These are certainly grave charges, and I can only hope for the present that you are mistaken. It may perhaps be your views of these doctrines and not the doctrines themselves. I hope it is so. And for his sake and yours I hope you

may in this be mistaken. For it would be much more pleasant to my feelings that a man should be mistaken in his views of teaching, than that another should be found teaching wrong. I must confess myself very slow to believe that Br<sup>r</sup> Bolton has taught false doctrine. If he has, it can easily be regulated when I come. And I am sure no one will be more ready to acknowledge it than he. Excuse me Br<sup>r</sup> Wilhelm but when a man has travelled with me over mountains, steams, deserts and seas; when he has jeopardised his life time and again for the cause of God; when he has left his wife and family in a far distant land and come without purse or ship to a foreign nation to preach the gospel, I know at least that he is sincere; and I am very slow to receive accusations against him. And while on the one hand no principle of friendship would cause me to compromise the gospel or depart from any correct principle. On the other hand I feel that the gospel has united me in eternal indissoluble bonds with my brethren who have been tried, proven and faithful. Again I have been with Br<sup>r</sup> Bolton a long time and have never heard him advance an incorrect doctrine. If however there is anything wrong, as I stated before it can easily be arranged when I come. Concerning the translation Br<sup>r</sup> Bolton must arrange about that during my absence. I cannot interfere. There is order in the Kingdom of God. I have desired him to attend to it and he must do it during my absence.

Any arrangements of that kind therefore must be made with him.

I will speak to Br<sup>r</sup> now concerning the matter you desired me. There are Wednesday some matters that you speak to me about money that I do not understand yet &c.

- 19 - A young man of the name of Lainville came and offered his services to revise the translation of the Book of Mormon. He has had a most superior education.

Saturday - 22 - He could only come of evenings from 7 to 10 <sup>have</sup> Wilhelm ten francs.

- 22 - An elderly gentleman of the name of "Lazare Augé" called to day being sent by Br<sup>r</sup> Bertrand to revise my translation of Br<sup>r</sup> M. I told him to call Monday

Monday evening & consulted the brethren and concluded to hire Mr Augé at One Hundred francs a month. to come at 10 and go at 3. Work to him

- 25 - Mr Lazare Augé came today and commenced work. He is a disciple of the Great Philosopher "Kronski" and has written several works. His work is easier to day. Wilhelm scarce ever wrote more than one or two thoughts full of confusion

Wilhelm in three months and a half, the time for which he claims wages, wrote but

Widnesday thirty six pages.

- 26 - Very heavy rain, no meeting. Br<sup>r</sup> & Sister Davies & Mr. & Mrs. Vanlambrouck came Saturday received an order in the post office for five pounds sterling this morning after paying for my bread & bread and milk there remained to me twelve sous.

Mr. Wilhelm called to day and I gave him fifty francs on account.

Thursday April 3 Received a short note from M. Vanlambrouck (son) saying he did not want to change his religion. well that is his business.

Thus<sup>r</sup> 10 I have had another 500 of the pamphlet "Aux amis" struck off. which costs me 25 francs. or 4/5 of a sou (account) apiece. Mr Augé and I are working on rapidly the translation of the Book of Mormon. he writes to my dictation. No one comes to meetings except the brethren. The political situation of the government of the country is such that they are frightened at their own shadow. and my friends advise me to wait and not take a hall for public preaching until Elder Taylor comes, as he has influential letters and I have none. We have had very cool weather for several weeks back. rain almost every day. The sun has not been seen for over two weeks. Can't sit even in the middle of the day without fire. but there has been no frost I believe since 2 or 3 weeks though I can't tell very well being in the heart of a great city. They mowed off the grass in the Lyceum garden today.

Sunday 22 Nearly all the trees in the Lyceum garden are in full leaf. a few are not the lowest are the latest of all. they have scarce a sign of a leaf yet. The beautiful Magnolia is in full bloom. As also all the fruit trees. I received

1251	Yesterday a strange note containing a demand for money - which he pretends are due him I bring entirely out of money I borrowed of Br <sup>r</sup> Sonne last evening 5 francs.
April 23	Wednesday Mission Peckard the Hore minister arrived to day in Paris - and went with me to meeting. I had appointed the meetings at Br <sup>r</sup> Sonne it being much more central for the brethren & friends.
Tuesday 29	Elder Taylor arrived this morning from England. He says he has money enough to publish the Book of Mormon in French and German I mentioned to him Wilhelm's conduct. He gave me money and told me to go and see if it were possible to settle with him amicably. I went, but his inde- sence was so great I remained but a moment and crept his threshold for the last time.
Wednesday 30	Elder Taylor received a very violent letter from Wilhelm full of falsehood. It was read before the meeting this evening and created much indignation. It was decided to meet at Rue de Tournon tomorrow evening and have this matter wiped up at once. Elder Taylor then wrote a note to Mr Wilhelm to meet him at the room tomorrow evening.
1 May	Council met this evening at 7 Rue de Tournon at 7 o'clock. Present John Taylor, one of the twelve Apostles - Curtis & Bolton, High Priest. Alphonse Bertrand, Priest. Robert Squires, Member - J P Wilhelm, Elder. The business before the council was to try Elder Wilhelm for a bad spirit and a false demand for money. His demand for money is contained in a letter to Elder Taylor. 17 April 1851. J'ai travaillé en faisant, donnant des leçons de français en avrillant pendant trois mois et demi. Depuis une convention faite par M <sup>r</sup> Taylor il n'est due depuis le milieu du mois de Janvier jusqu' à ce qu'il devra à raison de cinquante francs par mois. Je 75 Pour les deux premiers mois suppose que je n'aurai travaillé que la demi-journée comme aux mois de Janvier et de Février il n'est due rien. Deuxième la journée entière et me basant sur la convention de M <sup>r</sup> Taylor je demande comme supplément pour les deux premiers mois et en outre pour les leçons de français

Paris 17 April 1851. S<sup>r</sup> P Wilhelm  
 Dr<sup>r</sup> Taylor commenced a disturbed conversation with Wilhelm  
 and after a while turned to Elder Bolton and asked him to explain  
 what was unjust in Wilhelms account. Elder Bolton rose and said  
 "Wilhelm commenced counting his time 15 days before he was baptised  
 & that we all knew perfectly well that he was not at all to work for  
 the church during that time but only spent his time every day an hour  
 or more with us listening to the instructions of Elder Taylor. and for  
 that he brings in a charge of 100 francs a month. Again he spent at  
 the very least 3 weeks of the 3<sup>e</sup> months writing a pamphlet for him  
 self, with which the church had nothing to do.. never asked him to write it.  
 and never received of being full of gross errors of doctrine. On the contrary  
 Elders Taylor and Bolton were not pleased that he so long neglected this  
 revision of the Book of Mormon which he had undertaken after he was baptised.  
 Also that from the 15 January he had lost a week in which he did not  
 come near us at all. but was wholly occupied about his own affairs.  
 But the most dishonest act of all, was his charge of 25 francs for expenses

1851

May

in reading French which he gave to Elder Taylor. He gave these lessons in the time for which he already received pay and during which he ought to have been correcting the Book of Minutes with Elder Bolton. Elder Bolton also accused him of being exceeding idle and loitering - He was to give 12 a day to the B of M when we all knew that he very rarely commenced work before 7<sup>o</sup> past 3 o'clock & often 4 o'clock and always dropt everything and dined his hat when the Clock began to strike 5.

Elder Bolton pronounced all this downright robbery nothing less.

Wilhelm in answer said that although we had never said any thing to him for the first month or two, yet we had always considered his time the church's from the day he had first talked of being baptised, and expected his pay whether he did anything or not. He said that if Elder Taylor took up the time in teaching him (without doctrine or talking) it was all one, his time and pay went on.

After some further conversation Elder Taylor asked Wilhelm if he still persisted in his demand for 140 francs. Wilhelm answered he certainly did.

Elder Taylor then paid him and took his receipt.

Elder Taylor then asked Wilhelm what false declinations were of which he accuses Elder Bolton in a letter to Elder Taylor. Wilhelm at first denied having charged Elder Bolton with teaching false doctrine, but when having some more questions put to him, he accused Elder Bolton of having told a protestant man at a meeting, that a man did not receive the remission of his sins by the Holy Spirit before baptism by water.

Also, that Elder Bolton once said he did not know the meaning of the word sanctification &c. Elder Taylor smiled. Elder Bolton said he has said he did not understand the word sanctification as the other three churchmen used it, and cited the instance of his neighbor's wife on Long Island Dudley Brown's wife. She arose in methodist meeting in the School house, opposite John & Newell's Tavern, one evening during a Millerite excitement in 1840 and declared she had been sanctified three times in the night, which was the night before. Somebody asked her who did it. Elder Bolton then handed in a written accusation against Wilhelm accusing him with lying. Said he did not wish to walk any longer with us. He also accuses Wilhelm with dishonesty in demanding under penalty of a lawsuit money which he knew well was not due to him. Also of insulting conduct and lying about him. Elder Bolton moved that as Wilhelm has disgraced the priesthood, that the priesthood be taken from him. which, after much conversation and deliberation's insistence on the part of Wilhelm, was put to vote and carried unanimously.

Wilhelm repeatedly refused the council, and refused the priesthood. And when between the two, leaving the room, he turned back and with his face black with the shrills of hell and pale as ashes, he shook his fist over purple back his ear, defiance with satanic emphasis, and said, well you think you have taken the priesthood from me, but I say you haven't.

Elder Taylor said the Holy priesthood had power to give, and has never and authority to take it again.

Tuesday 6th  
I went to visit a hall which was offered us for public meeting, too far away, too high up - Elder Taylor and I each received a card of invitation to a reception party at his house from the minister of religious and public schools - but not misinterpreting what the card's meant at that time we did not go in the evening. We supposed it to be a hint that we had better call upon him, or it would be worse for us. So we resolved to call the next day.

Wednesday 7th  
Today Elder Taylor and I went to the minister's (as called by) - but it being not reception day, we could not see him. We left our cards. And were told if we wanted to have an interview with him we must

- 1851 send a request to that effect in writing through the post-office.
- May Elder Taylor then asked to see the secretary. We were admitted at once. Elder Taylor told him (through me as interpreter) that our object in France was to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ, and that we wished an interview with the minister. He treated us with a great deal of courtesy. Elder T showed him his letters of introduction and recommendation. He said he had no doubt we would obtain an interview. I presented him our first pamphlet "Our Aim is to visit Religious". Upon arriving at home Elder Taylor wrote a note requesting an audience which was translated and sent.
- When sending in his card Elder Taylor wrote "Desiré" upon it. The name seemed quite familiar to them
- 8 Elder Stenhouse President of the infant mission to Switzerland arrived in Paris today on his way to England.
- 10 Elder Stenhouse left today. See a note from the Minister (des cultes &c) granting an interview on Tuesday May 13 at 9 A.M.
- 13 Elder Taylor and I went to the Minister at 9, but it was 10 of 10 Tuesday A.M. before our turn came to go in. He was full of courtesy & kindess. He knew all about Desiré. Elder Taylor explained to him the object of this interview which was to make known to him that our object in France is to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ: that we wish to conform ourselves to all the laws and usages of the nation: that we want liberty to preach and the protection of government. He replied that his province is solely temporal and simply extends to the monetary affairs of the established church had a salary by government namely - the Roman Catholic, the Lutheran, Calvinist, Hebrew and Turkish. He then familiarly gave some friendly advice among other things to avoid strife against other churches. He finally referred us to the Minister of the Interior "Leon Fouquet". Saying further that if the established church entered a complaint to him of our doings against them he would then have to take notice of us by calling upon the Minister of the Interior to protect the established church, or silencing us. Upon leaving him I presented him a brochure - At 1 P.M. we went to see the minister of the interior. Could not see him but saw his private secretary. Elder Taylor showed him his letters and told him our object. He understood a little English. was very agreeable and talkative, told us to write a request for an interview with the minister himself. From thence we went to call upon the American Ambassador "Mr. Liver" but he was too sick to see us. Elder Taylor had a letter of introduction to him from Truman Smith member of the United States Congress. Mr. Liver sent his compliments and said he would be happy to see us so soon as the Doctor would permit him to see company.
- 15 Thursday Elder Taylor wrote a demand which was translated and sent to the Minister of the interior requesting authority to preach the gospel in Paris and also throughout France. To which an answer was given next day granting an interview with his "Chef de cabinet".
- 17 Saturday Called on the "Chef de Cabinet" and had an interesting interview with him. Among other things he said if we were Mormons and preached the same things as the Mormons of America, there would be no objections. He finally advised us to make a formal demand in writing of the Minister of the Interior setting forth also our doctrines and the -
- 19 Monday Wrote again to the Minister of the Interior, showing that we wanted to publish a paper, preach all over France, and print the Book of Mormon. I have been most excessively busy for a long while past. Writing, running about to see where I can get the B of M done the cheapest, and also the newspaper "Etoile N D'Or". I received a pressing invitation from Mr. Le Conte de Tocqueville to visit him at Brussels.

- 16 1851.—The past week has been one of great activity for me. Running in every direction  
May 26 to see about sugar making and sugar machines, publishing the Book of Mormon  
Monday Ecole du Desert & until my sprained ankle ached me to such a degree that it  
prevents me from sleeping for hours after I get to bed. I have also been occupied  
translating into French pieces for l'École at every moment I could get. We each  
received a card of invitation from the minister des cultes to a dinner at his  
hotel for Wednesday evening but not understanding it we did not go. At  
1 o'clock all we went to call where the "Prefet de Police" saw his secretary who  
said that our affair was under consideration; that it was a most "grave" question  
to ask to preach throughout France under sanction of government.
- Tuesday—Gave copies to the Binder (Mme Dulong) for the 1<sup>st</sup> N<sup>o</sup> of the "École"  
27 an amount of running about - called at the Minister of the Interior and  
the American Minister could see neither of them
- Wednesday—Called again on the ministers of culte he and of the Interior, not visible.  
28 saw the American Minister for only a moment. In my legs the whole day  
running about sugar Machines and Ministers.
- Thursday—This day the "École du Desert" which in English is "School of Desert" was  
29 published and sent to our room. Sent copies everywhere to our friends. By 12 M  
I was completely worn out, lagged down with running about. At 12 we started  
to leave Paris by the Havre Rail Head to go to London to be present at the  
general conference. But Elder Taylor who always is everlasting gloomy and  
knows as though he had all the chronicles ahead made us miss the cars.  
So we went to 8<sup>th</sup> Squares and spent the rest of the day and night.
- Friday—Left Paris at 8 A.M. by rail head via Havre for London - Mr Peckard was  
30 also in the cars. Upon arriving in Havre I left Elder Taylor and went  
with Mr Peckard to visit his little flock - And I went to hunt up some of  
my old acquaintances. I first went to hunt for Mr Joseph Lebretton with  
whom I used to live in Havre in 1852 and 3. His health is good, looks no  
older, though he has suffered much grief - having been unfortunate in business.  
Little Henry had grown up a bad boy and was now in the Army - the old lady  
maman Regnault was well but much broken - she must be over 70 years old.  
The daughter who was born in my bed has grown to be a beautiful girl of  
18 or 19 but the Mother ran away with a German Catholic Priest leaving  
her husband and children and is now living with the Priest in Paris. To the  
peculiar shame and grief of her family - Others also in J Barbe.
- Saturday—Left Havre at 10 P.M. by steamboat and arrived at South Hampton at 8 in  
31 the morning and after the usual attack of cholera at an English customhouse where  
all is brutal harshness we started by the express train for London where we  
arrived at noon. We went to Dr Brays and there met Dr Pack. Went to a  
general council meeting at 2 P.M. sat until 6 then had refreshments, then  
continued until eleven. Decided that the bodies of the 3 brethren who had  
died in England while on their missions should be shipped to the valley.
- Sunday—General Conference met at 12 past 10 about 2000 present. In the afternoon  
June 1 the American Elders were sent by fours into different quarters of London to  
preach in the afternoon and evening. I was sent to the west end - where I  
preached and spent a happy time listening to the other brethren. Preaching began  
at 3 and at 6 and only got back to Dr Brays at 1 A.M. - when I slept.
- Monday—I was present at a feast given today by the London Conference. for a short  
2 account of which see second Number of the "École du Desert".
- Tuesday—a general council was held today. Almost all the American Elders from  
3 all the nations of Europe were present. Among other things the Channel  
Islands were placed under the direction and jurisdiction of the French  
Mission - detached from England and united with France. Dr Pack  
is to go there to preside.
- Wednesday—Visited the great exhibition with Dr Pack. Stupendously grand -  
4 The building is as great a curiosity as anything in it. What riches -

1851

June 5—Started out early to see something of London. Visited St Pauls. Westminster  
Thursd 5<sup>th</sup>. Tunnels, Trafalgar square, Queens docks and in fact saw a good  
part of London. The Zoological gardens also.

Friday—Council meetings was held to day at Br<sup>r</sup> Brays of all the french missionaries  
6 present in London. Present of the Quorum of the 12. John Taylor  
High Priest Curtis Edwin Bolton — of the 70<sup>s</sup> John Pack — Elders McNaugh-  
ten, De la Mare, Hart, Hyde Jr.

Elder Taylor said: the book of Mormon is under the direction of Elder  
Bolton as also the "École du Desert" under the supervision of Elder Taylor  
Elder Taylor then appointed Elder Philip de la Mare to visit the Bellanger  
branch as soon as possible. The Elders being invited to express their feelings  
Elder McNaughten said he felt an interest in the french Mission and  
desired Elder Taylor to dispose of him as he should see fit. he said that  
Guernsey and Jersey had received the gospel, the other little islands adjacent  
had not. Moved seconded and carried that a conference be held in  
Jersey on Sunday June 22. Elder James H Hart felt rejoice at the  
thoughts of being called to proclaim the gospel in France was willing to  
go how when and where the brethren pleased. Elder John Hyde Jr also  
said as Elder Hart moved and seconded that Elders Hart and Hyde Jr go  
on missions to France. carried. Resolved that Elder Pack preside over  
Jersey and the contiguous portion of France. Elder Bolton asked that  
the relative positions of Elders Pack and McNaughten be defined. as the latter  
is now president of the Channel Islands. Elder Taylor then said. Elder Bolton  
labors on the Translation of the Book of Mormon and on the "École" will necessarily  
require him to reside in Paris. Elder Bolton would therefore preside over that  
portion of France. And Elder Pack at the Islands to extend his labors and  
stretch over into France and preside over that portion. including Bellanger's branch  
Elders Bolton & Pack must cooperate. And Elder Pack must send help to Elder  
Bolton when he needs it (answering a question by Elder Pack he said) Normandy is  
now under the jurisdiction of Elder Bolton. He then gave Elder Bolton much  
instruction relating to the B of M. and about going to the different ministers  
and urging the demand for liberty to preach. It was voted that after visiting  
Bellanger. Elder J. L. Mare go where he can do most good. Elder Pack is to  
make his way into France as soon as possible and not spend his time at  
the Islands. Elder Taylor still remain in England a while then go to Germany.

Saturday — Left London at 2 P.M. on my way back to Paris, the field of my labors. by way  
of Southampton and Havre. having paid 30 francs (\$3.65 dollars) to go by come  
When I arrived at S<sup>t</sup> Hamptons the storm was so fierce I would not risk  
crossing the channel to Havre. Called on Elder Thomas President of the Branch  
who went with me visiting the saints.

Wednesday—The storm has raged until this evening. I have spent a most charming  
11 visit at S<sup>t</sup> Hamptons. What a good people. I have preached several times to them.  
The Saints here are full of love and union. I will especially mention Sister  
Meads. Br<sup>r</sup> and Sister Iles. Sister Elizabeth White. in fact all of them if I could  
recollect their names. At 11 P.M. I got on board the steamer for Havre. obtained  
a good berth and slept sound.

Thursday—Upon coming up on deck in the morning and looking around. I there beheld  
12 Monsieur Juste Biel in whom counting room I was in 1832 and 1833.  
He could not recognize me I had to tell him my name. Yet I have always  
been told heretofore that my countenance has not changed at all.  
Arrived at Havre at 10 A.M. went to a cheap Hotel - Rue de la Gaff. Abriou Hotel  
(Creeds) a first rate place and cheap. I went about visiting my old acquaintan-  
ces. Saw Mr. Barbe & Captain of Fathers Ships. One of them told me of his  
Fathers death. I have been expecting it for a year he was so old and broken  
He has been a monstrous hard working man all his life. And I knew  
that when he gave up business he would not last long. I also called

11 June

upon a Monsieur Henriet one of Mr. Peckard's congregation - after sitting a short time I left, promising to come again at 7 P.M. - when there would be a number collected - Accordingly I went at 7, to the House of Madame Julie Thomas, Lagouville, where about 10 persons were assembled, all having a most excellent spirit. I preached to them about 1 hour and then conversed with them until after 9 o'clock. They were frequently moved to tears and so was I. The Spirit of God was in our midst in power. They received my testimony with joy and gladness.

Friday 13 Spent the day in visiting among those I met last evening - dined with a Monsieur Muller a rich merchant belonging to Peckard's congregation and spent the evening with Mr. Lebreton.

Saturday 14 By invitation I breakfasted with a family named Henriet. A most excellent godly people - At parting they put a roll of paper in my hand containing 15 francs which I would not refuse as I really want God's blessing upon them. I left them in tears and left them my blessing promising to come and see them again. Left Havre at 9 A.M. and arrived at Paris at 3 and came immediately to Br<sup>r</sup> Robert Squires, where I am to live, he giving me a room sent free.

Sunday 15 I revisited with my brethren this evening at our little meeting Elder Bertrand prepared a letter for me to the Prefet de Police (Carlier) renewing the demand for liberty to preach in France.

Monday 16 Copied the letter to the Prefet and put it in the Post. Commenced again the work of revising my translation with Mr. Augé of the Book of Mormon I have 3 miles to walk and get there at 10, then translate and be writing until 5 then walk 1½ miles to dinner in another direction than 3 miles home. Then I ban myself writing translating and preparing articles for the next number of the "Etoile".

Friday 20 Finished this day the first revision of my translation of the B. of Mormon 16th page being over last days work.

Monday July 7 Sent the "Etoile" from the Printer. Sent 200 to Jersey. Br<sup>r</sup> Bertrand has offered to come every evening and revise for the press. Mr. Augé's work, of which he is eminently capable.

Thursday 10 Sent yet another letter to the Prefet (Carlier) urging an answer to my request for permission to preach. Mr. Peckard arrived in Paris this evening and remained with us over Sunday, we then had a first rate meeting in the evening - he partook of the bread and wine with us.

Monday 14 I received a paper today, without envelope, folded in square, no address, no seal, just like as if it came from a hog - forbidding Elder Taylor or I from preaching in Paris or in any part of France, and this by order of Carlier Prefet de Police and Leon Fauchie Minister of the Interior. More mere verbal Upbraidings - may God reward them -

Sunday 20 Called upon a man who wrote to me that he wanted to see me about the doctrines of the church. The man has an honest heart and I believe he would receive the truth. But his wife? Oh Dear!!!!!!

I receive a letter from Elder Taylor, very uncharitable, very unjust, very ungentlemanly, untrue and very undeserved on my part and for which he will be doing some day or other. God knows, and so do the Brethren here and Mr. Augé that the translation of the Book of Mormon into French is literally emphatically, truly and essentially my own work. 95 out of 100 of the words are my own; yes I may say 99. Mr. Augé a learned Frenchman, no way connected with the church, ignorant of its doctrines, not understanding one English word except through the Latin and French, he merely corrects the grammar. His taste ever has changed a noon; and when he does want to he calls on me to do it. And I have to rack my brain, to find another phrase or word which he will accept as French and which retains perfectly and in full the sense of the English. This letter has had an

1851 effect upon me such that I shall have to forget before I can write or preach  
July with pleasure. He is a most jealous being - he wants to be a lord god almighty  
and have every particle of the honor of every single thing himself, and never  
allow to another anything whatever, it ever so deserving. He has the greatest neck  
I ever saw to make everybody think him some great one / but only for a time.  
for they find him out after a while. I verily believe it is that spirit which  
he manifest is the chief cause why this mission does not prosper. There is a  
want of union which has been a source of bitter anguish to me. Br<sup>r</sup> Taylor  
and I have never been allowed to be together in the flesh on this mission. Br<sup>r</sup>  
Taylor and he had some words in Boulogne. As to money matter's, the brethren  
in England have handed out liberally in aid of the french Mission to brother  
Taylor - but I have never received a cent from him out of that money for  
my expenses, not one cent. He wants his name to be put as translator  
of the Book of Mormon into french, tho' he has never had anything to do with  
it at all - except to use part of the money for its publication. And left me to  
get the rest which I have done. 320 francs) I write this, being determined  
that these facts shall be on my journal for the benefit of my posterity.

Monda 21 gave copy to the printer for the 3<sup>r</sup> Number of the "Étoile"

August — I have been much vex'd and tormented by the police laws and regulations

Tuesday 12 relating to the press. And have not dared to put the paper to press til now. And  
have at length been forced to have the paper stamped for the "Étoile". The  
clerk whose business it is to decide. Said it was all politics from one end to the  
other. This 3<sup>r</sup> N contains only the 3<sup>rd</sup> General article of the Presidency and  
the conclusion of an article on the book of Mormon.

Wednesday 27 I have been to dine two or three times with Mr. Marc Ducloux the  
painter whom have engaged to publish the B. of M. & the Étoile. He manifest  
a most excellent spirit. He is getting entirely new type founded for the B. of M.  
At his house I met many influential protestants - some good, some bad.  
Today having to go near where I used to breakfast in the Quatre S<sup>e</sup> Gémeaux rue  
de l'Odor 5. I desired to enquire how do do. - The poor woman burst into tears and  
said her little Joseph a year old was dying. I went up and saw him. he  
had the dropsy on the brain - from teething.

Friday 29 Little Joseph and Madame Ducloux both died last night. - in 2. of consumption

I received two letters from home today. All well! all is well!!

Sunday 31 Having received a special note of invitation from Mr. Ducloux I  
went this afternoon to the most beautiful village of Auvers just out  
of Paris, south west, to attend the funeral of Madame Ducloux

September — Br<sup>r</sup> Evans from Wales with his bride (who was miss Brookes) she was  
an old maid baptised by Elder W. Hewitt some where on the coast of France  
Monda in Brittany - near Jersey called upon me this afternoon. Just after  
they came in to the room a german man well educated a protestant  
Speaking french fluently, came in also with a tall sallow complexioned  
spare woman. This woman is an acquaintance of Mr. Peckards. She  
amused me. She pretended to have seen me 7 years ago in vision and she  
had seen Br<sup>r</sup> Evans and his wife and lots more - any amount of it.

The man appeared honest hearted. They left in about an hour and  
I went out to walk to show Br<sup>r</sup> Evans something of Paris.

Tuesday 2 Rain - so I escorted Br<sup>r</sup> & sister Evans to the Louvre and left them; and I  
spent the day trying to secure the patent for the 18 Shooter rifle. I found  
I must begin by paying the French government about 1500 francs for a  
patent for only 3 years. so I gave that up, having myself about 18 francs in  
my pocket, and am owing 225 francs.

Wednesday 3 Spent the day with Br<sup>r</sup> Evans visiting the curiosities of Paris.

The german came again this evening and spent 2 hours with me and  
left apparently well pleased with all I told him.

11 1851 The german came again with another woman than before, and after  
Thurs about an hours conversation desired to be baptised. The woman then went  
Septem<sup>r</sup> her way and the man went with me to Mr Merguer's who has long desired  
4 baptism but his wife cannot make up her mind. His son 13 years old wants  
to be baptised. I appointed Sunday Morning to leave Paris at 7<sup>th</sup> past 7 for  
baptizze. Elder Evans & wife spent the day at Versailles

"With a sad heart and broken spirit I will now state circumstances that  
have transpired here which I had not thought to mention. Last winter  
made the acquaintance of a gentleman named Louis Van Lembrouck, his family  
is composed of a wife and daughter, the girls name Matilda. Being lonely,  
I visited them often, and insensibly became strongly attached to them. At  
the time I received the letter from home containing the account of Ellens  
conduct which came near upsetting my reason (<sup>if you</sup>) this excellent family  
redoubled their attentions and treated me with all the most fond, affectionate  
kindness as if I had been their own brother. But for their attentions I am almost  
sure I would have lost my reason. Some past so pleasantly and swiftly while at  
their house. Matilda was learning English. I corrected her lessons. I love  
them all with real paternal affection. Mrs V was tormented because the  
neighbors talked about my being there so much. And finally sent a polite  
note to say he did not want to change his religion. I took it as a hint  
and visited them no more. Though it cost me sore not to see them once  
more. Last Monday upon the reception from home of the draft of my  
eighteen shillings I wrote a note to Mr Van Lembrouck to say so. for when  
I wrote home for this plan it was at his request and I had passed my  
word to him that he should share the profits if he would take the trouble to  
sell the patent. He wrote me back to call at his house for him. This  
was a death blow to me so to speak. I did not want to go to his house  
for that would tear open afresh, wounds long since trying to heal. for even  
seeing him had affected me very much and I dreaded the effects upon  
my nerves of seeing them all together. However I went, and upon reaching  
the door I stood at least ten minutes before I could ring, and when I did  
I wished from the bottom of my soul they might not be at home. But Mr V  
came to the door and invited me in. I felt as though I had rather have  
dunk through the floor. I entered and met the outstretched hands of  
Madame which I took coldly and formally when my soul desired to embrace  
her. And I could see she also acted under restraint. But my worst  
trial was to come. I turned my eyes towards where stood Matilda; our  
eyes met. I read a whole history in that one look. She had been weeping  
much her eye was greatly swollen. I took her proffered hand and held  
it between mine then sunk upon a chair. My brain buried with the  
recollection of the pleasant evenings I had spent in their society, and the cause  
of my seeking their acquaintance (Ellen) and so intense were my feelings  
that I had to muster up the whole energy of my soul to keep from fainting  
several times I lost myself so to speak. After a while Mr V was ready  
and we left together. Oh how I did try to get air when I arrived in the  
street. I scarce was able to hear what he said much less answer.  
The recollection of that abominable art evening (Tuesday 2) and the anguish  
I endured I will not pretend to describe. Upon leaving Mr V and reaching  
my room those powerful emotions so long pent up burst out in wild and  
uncontrollable fury. I had seen poor misguided Ellen. I wept  
with spasmodic force for several hours. and in fact spent the most of  
the night on my knees in earnest prayer for my reason. Elder Squire  
sat with me and pray'd several times with me. From what I have seen  
since and from what I can recollect I believe I was partially deranged  
I became more calm towards morning. But may god grant that  
I may never have such another day and night. Even now (16 June 1852)

1851 the tears are flowing copiously while I write. I would say more  
Septem but cannot - my heart is too crushed.

Saturday 6 Br. Melgar's son Adolph called upon me at q and after considerable questioning I received him for baptism. His mother sent upon me to day named Bentley. She appears to me to be possessed of a very lying deceiving spirit. She is always pretending to have seen, long before hand in vision, every body she sees. She is all the time laying on hands to heal the sick. God forever and ever boasting of what great things she has done. She pretends that she wants to be baptised but says it is not I must baptise her - for the saw in her vision that it was to be one of the twelve and not me. She more especially wants to receive the laying on of hands for the gift of the Holy Ghost, so that she can certain more power than she has. At any rate whatever spirit she is possessed by, it is not in accord with my spirit.

Sabbath

7 After waiting ten minutes over the time appointed for Br. Evans whom I had invited to go with us he not coming we started off and met at the door Madame Bentley, and we then went on together to S' Cuern. (Br. Squires & family. Book 8, 1.) We there met Br. Melgar & all his family. We got into a boat and crossed part of the Seine on to the Island of S' Cuern the scene of our former baptisms. On landing and reaching the spot where we have baptised before we found there so many persons fishing for sport that we were forced to hunt another place to be alone to baptise. Br. Squires and I started off and soon found a little island covered with underbrush and trees, shoal water hard sand bottom and swift current along its base, and the river being low there was no water between that and the main island. So I sent Br. Squires after the others and I went to pray alone. They came in about 1/2 an hour - we then gathered in a circle and sang and prayed and after the usual questions I led them one by one Br. Melgar his wife and oldest son Adolph into the water and baptised them. After dressing we again had prayer. Then partaking of a slight repast of bread and wine we returned home about 8. Madame Bentley told us the german man had upon him a real devilish spirit speaking all manner of evil against us. At the evening meeting Br. Melgar and his son came and were confirmed Sister Melgar being too fatigued. We had a delightful meeting.

Monday 8

Thanks be to my eternal Father I gave the first 30 days of the manuscript of the Book of Mormon in French to the printer Marc Quinton. What a glorious era in my eventful life. I am full of prayer praise and thanksgiving to my God for his grace and mercy in having allowed me the never of this great work - He praise him is my soul. Oh God preserve me faithful to the end, and save me in thy Kingdom. This book is all my anxiety - give me a meek humble spirit and give me the light and intelligence necessary for me day by day. Give me a heart to understand and abide all the counsels of thy servants who are set over me. And give me thy spirit that I and all of mine may not lose the reward of my labors by my unfaithfulness. Oh God thou knowest my whole heart & soul, night, mind, and strength is in thy work therefore enable me to do much good and no evil. Amen.

Tuesday 10 Wednesday I gave copy also to the printer for another 30 days which I hope to preserve as a memento. We had a good little meeting.

I preached upon the priesthood.

In consequence of some foreigners intriguing against the french government the police have given notice to all foreigners to appear at the police office within 3 days, to get a permit to reside at Paris. So I went today, but owing to the immense crowd not very respectable in appearance I did not like to mix among them. And finding I should have to wait too long I came away.

1851

September

Friday

12.

Started at ½ past 7 this morning without my breakfast to buy and be among the first at the Police office, but when I reached there they gave me the ticket 405, there being that number of persons before me, so I could not wait; more especially as I was placed in a rank where the men next to me stunk so it made me feel sick. So I left, returned my ticket and went to break-fast from Hennie to the printers, where I remained correcting proof until 12 M<sup>o</sup>. Then went to see Mr. Donford Secretary of U.S. Legation & had my passport issued to rende in Paris. He told me the present police regulation did not concern me. As I was about leaving he says Mr. Ambassador came in, and told me the same thing. When addressing me, he excused himself for not having yet given a letter of introduction to the American Ambassador at Berlin or Dr<sup>r</sup> Taylor. He had been very ill - and out of town until now.

So he wrote the letter at once and gave it to me & I returned to my room.

Sunday

14.

Called in the forenoon on Mr. Waddington - returned at 2 P.M. Found Elder Bertrand waiting to read manuscript of Book of Mormon with me. Evening meeting commenced at 7, 12 persons present. all attentive. I spoke of baptism soon. Confirmed Anna & Neddy. The spirit of the Lord filled the room. I have seldom had greater liberty of speech - but spoke but short on the first principles of the gospel.

Monday

15.

Went to the Police Office or rather passport office. They told me my passport is all right, it needs no visa unless I wish to settle in Paris.

I feel spurred in spirit, and I feel like going over to a few of my thoughts. Elder Taylor myself and Elder John Pack were sent on a mission together to France. On the way, I being unknown and backward about asking to trust him to Elder Taylor as being my president and universally known I received but about 15 dollars in all the United States where I passed. As Elder Taylor received the gifts for the French mission, Elder Taylor paid my passage to Liverpool from New York 50 dollars, which he rec'd again but of 50 pounds raised for me in Manchester. I had to pay him 15 pounds. 75 dollars. This was all I received in England - until a long while after. Elder Pack went to England to gather money for him and I. I rec'd from him about 16 pounds more. June 1<sup>st</sup> last Elder Taylor gave me 25 £ 30/- out of 150 he had rec'd in England towards publishing the book of Mormon. This I have paid to the Frenchman who helps me with the translation - and to the printer for the newspaper l'Étoile du Décret. And at this moment I have but 15 francs £2.75-5/- I have not heard a word from Elder Taylor since the 10 July.

Although I have written to him 3 or 4 times very urgently for money, that the work might not have to cease for the want of means. For after writing so often and receiving no answer I had concluded it was because he was coming himself soon so I gave the copy for another Étoile on the 8<sup>th</sup>. Now altho' the printer says nothing yet he acts as though he is afraid to trust me which in my utterly helpless condition cuts me to the heart's core. The Étoile is printed and he retains it, and presented me his bill last Monday, and what pains me the most is that I have to go and see him every morning on account of reading and correcting proofs sheets of the B of Mormon. It is difficult to be not sensible as I do imagine how galling this is to me.

Saturday last I wrote to Elder Richards (F.D) to lend me 5 £ holding myself responsible for the amount if Elder Taylor would not pay it.

Saturday

20.

After another week of intolerable suspense. Elder Taylor has sent me 5 £ (25 francs) I handed Mr. Dutoux 100 and liberated l'Étoile, but I felt ever at not having the other 5 £ for him. In Elder Taylor's letter he says he and Elder Richards (F.D) are coming to Paris.

Monday

22.

Elders Taylor and Franklin L Richards arrived - and went to the Hotel de Rome. Rue Jacob.

Wednesday

24.

Elder Taylor gave me money to pay off Mr. Dutoux. and he and I dined at the Tuilleries.

1851

- September
- Friday 26 Spent several hours with Mr Vandembrouck in company with Elder Taylor. Then dined at the Hotel with Elders Taylor & Richards - after which I took a very long walk with Elder Richards down the River, then through the Champs Elysees and along the boulevards etc.
  - Saturday 27 Hosted Madame Bentz to day at 5 o'clock, by the counsel of Elder Taylor I would not baptise her without as she is full of lying visions. But Elder Taylor says baptise her - and so it's done. God help her. She has need of it.
  - Sabbath 28 We had a good meeting this evening. Elders Taylor and Richards each spoke. I interpreted. Madame Bentz was confirmed.
  - Monday 29 A council was held this evening in Elder Taylor's room when Elder Taylor administered a very severe rebuke to me for not writing to him often while he was away. I told him that the last time I wrote to him I had asked him as a young child could a father whether it would appear like pride or vanity for me to have my name put in the post of sermon as translator. and I told him he had written me a most cruel insolent harsh letter in return, that cut me to the heart that I have been broken minded and sick ever since. He was very severe upon me. I asked him to forgive me and I would try to learn wisdom. I did not feel that I deserved so great severity - yet knows and the saints here knew too, that I have labored with most faithful unceasing diligence to do what I thought was required of me, and have invariably done right as far as the light and intelligence God has given me, and that too, much of the time half fed and half clothed, which has kept me weak in mind and body.
- October
- Tuesday 1 Elder Richards left last Thursday. From the moment of his departure I have had to give all my time and attention to the sugar manufacturing. If Elder Taylor be never me to death, my ankle pains me at night so I can scarcely sleep. I am really ill - not able to go - but go I must. I am too weak to speak more than a few words at a time and that only in a whisper. Visited to day in company with Elder Taylor a vast concert turned into a sugar refinery. Worked at the barrier Pajoy - had to act as interpreter for Elder T for over three hours.
  - Wednesday 8 Very sick and very hoarse worse if possible than yesterday. A meeting having been opened for this evening at Madame Bentz about a mile off. I requested Elder Barraud to attend to it, but he not coming to my room on't past 7. Took a cab and went myself rather than disappoint them it being the first meeting held out of my room or Elder Taylor's in Paris. There were 6 strangers present. I came and made the attempt to speak - the spirit of god came upon me and I spoke loud for 20 of an hour. And when the spirit was gone I was gone. Elder Barraud came in after I had been speaking awhile. The strangers appeared much pleased for sake to fit us - bathed my feet and took insecticides. Dr. S. Doctor Dugue was attending him and attended all the day.
  - Thursday 9 I remained in bed until 11 o'clock when Elder Taylor came for me to go to Quas (7 hours ride per sail boat) with him to visit a number of sugar manufacturers from the sugar belt - and gave as interpreter. He told me to rise in the name of the Lord. I did so - went with him to a newspaper editor to get letters of introduction and left Paris at 1 P.M. and arrived at Quas at 4 past 7. We went immediately to a great establishment were well received and shown all over it - which kept us until 10. Then went to a hotel, ate a hearty supper and retired.
  - Saturday 11 Slept well and arose well. Visited the whole establishment again. Left Quas at 4 past 12 P.M. and returned to Paris. Crepel-Delpi is the name of the manufacturer he was not at home but in Paris. This son received us.
  - Sunday 12 Called at 7 o'clock on Mr Crepel who received us with a great deal of kindness and offered to give all the knowledge that he could.
  - Monday 13 Went to at least a dozen places today with Elder Taylor to see about sugar making machines etc. - Tuesday 14. Mr Muller with us
  - Wednesday 15 Elder Taylor left this day at 1 P.M. for Quas on his way to Germany. He will spend a week at Quas, and wait for Jerome whom he has written for from Jersey. To take charge of a mission to Quas and Italy-Court. I am really

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- October 11 worn out with importuning working on Elder Taylor who cannot stir in Paris without me as interpreter - all other work has had to cease, Book of Mormon, etc & all.
- Thursday 16 Held a meeting this evening at Madame Berly's. 9 Strangers present, all very attentive. 2 asked for baptism. 2 wavering - Appointed Sunday morning for baptism. To be at St. Omer at 10.
- Sunday 19 Arrived at St. Omer at 11. in company with some of the saints and those desiring baptism. After the usual ceremonies of prayer and questions I baptized 4 persons. And we all walked back to town together. At the evening meeting they were all 4 confirmed and all bore testimony. I was wearied out when I got to my room, having walked 15 miles at least - being on my feet from 10 AM to 12 PM.
- Saturday 25 Since many months past, the spirit has been unceasingly whispering to me to go to France, that there was a work there to be begun. But having been importuned over head and ears in Paris, I could not find time to leave. But finally the Lord's house is upon me: the calculations and intentions of the past 2 or 3 months have been near when my Destroying my health and peace of mind. So that Elder Taylor & Richard gave a resignation of their charge of some ministry to my existence. Elder Taylor has also wanted some one to go to Habre for some time back. 5 months ago he gave me that mission when I should get time. Also about a week since Elder Pack wrote to say he desired to go there. I answered him I was all ready to go by Elder Taylor's appointment. Thus the spirits of the 3 sent were unanimous. I accepted this as a good time. I have been several weeks winding up my affairs in Paris, leaving the correction of my translation of the Book of Mormon, and the publications to me finally being all ready. Went Paris last evening at 11 past 9 by the cheap train and here I am in HABRE where I arrived this morning at 6. Went to the Almon Hotel (good chab.) slept about 2 hours - breakfasted, and then commenced my visits. I first called on M<sup>r</sup> Berney whose address I had. I found her in great distress because her children could not get church and her husband is keeping another woman. I comforted her in the name of the Lord if she would do right herself she should have her children with her, and all would be well. I also visited 2 or 3 others by request I appointed a meeting for Sunday evening.
- Sunday 26 Spent a very pleasant day visiting some good people whom I hope to baptize our meeting in the evening was held at Madame Berly's Rue d'Albion 56 & it is a present, all well pleased, more than well pleased - I felt great freedom. I was treated with most warm hearted kindness after the meeting. It was hard for me to get away. Oh how full my heart was to the Lord in thanks in my way before returning to rest - and again on rising in the morning - I will tell God that I believe I have never neglected my prayers in this mission.
- Monday 27 Visited today some of my old acquaintances. Annie Durand, my fellow clerk he received me coldly. Mr. Baile - Cap Thompson & Miss New York, (pader) Mr Joseph Le Brun with whom I used to live. Of course I visited these who attended the meeting. There were mostly part of Mr. Fould's congregation since his schism they had kept together and held their own little prayer meetings, not able to content themselves with the chaff of other churches. They were earnestly praying the Lord to send a true anointed servant to them.
- Wednesday 29 Held another delightful meeting last evening. The spirit of God was powerful in our midst. Tears of joy were shed. As I am satisfied these are I waiting to be baptized I spent several hours to day hunting a fitting place towards the light houses on the ocean beach, but found none.
- Thursday 30 Spent the most of the day hunting a place for baptizing along the banks of the Seine to Havre, but could find none. No one has asked yet for baptism but the spirit whispers. Hunt quickly - Held another delightful meeting this evening, 10 present. all delighted. I too.
- Friday 31 Rain all day. could not go to hunt a place to baptize. Went to Habre and read American News papers. The New York Herald was there containing

Baptisms at Havre - France

1851

November an account of the 24<sup>th</sup> July celebration in the valley. Held a meeting and gave notice I should baptise tomorrow. and asked who was on the Lord's side. 15 persons present. no one spoke for baptism to me. but there was much whispering to and fro.

Saturday 1 Alternately rain and shine. After breakfast I walked out on the end of the Jetee or Pier to see if there was any chance to baptise in the ocean: but no. the storm is great and the waves furious and the shore abrupt. So I gave that up. and prayed most earnestly to the Lord to show us a place. and felt sure I should find one. At 12 M I went to the place of meeting. there were quite a number there of the little congregation. I told them my spirit was not to go to the Ocean as I had thought to yesterday. at a Bathing House close by town. This gave universal satisfaction. Much conversation ensued about sundry places finally Sister Jeanne named Gourmay. a charming little valley & hamlet about 2 1/2 miles from Havre. There is a mill stream of clear water. I at once recollect the place and decided to go. I went out in search of an omnibus and after hunting near an hour in the rain without any umbrella (thing I have but rarely made use of in my life) I succeeded in finding one that easily contained 12 Persons. A little after 1 P.M we started 12 in number. of whom 4 were ready for baptism and all the rest very much wrought upon by the Spirit of God. On the way we sang the songs of Zion composed by our dear Brother Bertrand and conversed of heavenly things. An elderly lady very devout a Roman Catholic, her neck full of chaplets, crosses, images, medals, charms etc etc during our conversation gave glory to God and desired baptism. This gave us all very great joy. in fact our hearts were loaded with joy. Madame Henrion's elder son who accompanied us soon put up a tent for the sisters to dress under. After singing and pray and covenanting for 10 minutes past 2 I entered the water holding the Roman Catholic Lady by the hand she being the oldest of all. I baptised her and 4 more. thus 1<sup>st</sup> Marie Joseph Blaupot 2<sup>nd</sup> Marie Louise Turbet. 3<sup>rd</sup> Julie Thomas. 4<sup>th</sup> Julie le Roy. 5<sup>th</sup> Jane Limard.

In what an enchanting spot we found. a lovely little brook 10 feet wide 2 feet deep. meandering through grassy meadows. Fall trees standing in banks here and there. in the bottom of a deep narrow valley. with little hamlets dotted at here and there. high continuous hills on both sides. variegated with forest and cultivation. The water pure and transparent as crystal flowing smoothly but swiftly along. We chose a lovely spot. retired from observation where there are thick bushes to dress behind.

During the whole time we were along side of the water. the sun shone warm and clear; the rain dropped in little scudding, cristal drops. And a most brilliant and complete rainbow adorns the heavens in the east. Happened to us that God shed upon us the light of his countenance. the heavens wept for joy. Our Mother ratified our covenant by signing it in the heavens.

We returned to Havre the most happy company that ever travelled that road. I gave notice of a meeting for tomorrow afternoon. And thus ended one of the most sweet days of my life. a day never to be forgotten. Glory to my God.

Sabbath 2 I was sleeping soundly this morning at near 7 O'clock when I was aroused by loud thumps on the door. I opened it and in walked Elders Pack and Delamare. They had started from Jersey and gone to Paris to see Elder Taylor but he had got out of patience waiting for them and had proceeded on to Germany. And they were now on their way back to Jersey with a steamer in their car. I was glad to have their company, or to aid me in the ordinance of laying on hands this evening.

Having 7 more persons to baptise. I hired an omnibus again and 11 persons of us including Elders Pack and Delamare returned to Gourmay where I baptised 7 persons more. Madame Henrion & all her children according to my prophecy. and Marie Joseph Lebreton. daughter to the Catholic lady that was. Children names are. Henry. Eugene. Hermitta. Gustave. Daniel.

- 1851 November 11 This day the rainbow shone in the east from the time we left town & all the time we were at Gourney - about 20 Peasants stood quickly off at a distance - and into silence by the solemnity of the ceremony. And the proprietor of the Land happening to come up just as I was about to begin he stood at a respectful distance with his hat in his hand. We held some conversation with him - he was pleased with the ordinance - and gave us permission to use the place as often as we wanted to. The sisters dressed in the omnibus pulling down the curtains. We returned to town as happy as peace internal and external could make us.
- After partaking of a slight repast I opened the meeting at 7. Administered the sacrament - preached a little - then confirmed 12 persons. I then proceeded to organise the branch and appointed Elder Hart president according to the counsel of Elder Taylor. Elder Hart is at Jersey, and will come at once if I will wait for him - though I feel that my work is accomplished here for which God sent me. Eliza Pack & Eleazar left next morning early.
- Tuesday 11 I have spent the past week visiting among the Saints, comforting, strengthening & instructing them. My health continues bad - Bachelor - last Friday I baptised a Frenchman from Caen named Laurent Lepelletier and confirmed him Sunday afternoon. I have held meetings every other evening, such delightful meetings. Today while writing letters at Sister Henrion's Elder Hart found me out and came there. I then took him around and introduced him to the Saints
- Wednesday 12 We had a delightful meeting this evening. Elder Hart was unanimously accepted by the branch as their President. He ordained Henri & Eugene to the office of priests. And amid tears of love, joy & sorrow I bid the beloved saints a fare for a little season. O God Eternal Father, bless thy beloved children of Haven protect them from every evil of whatever nature - gather them with thine elect and save them in thy celestial kingdom. Amen. dinner
- Thursday 13 Left Havre this morning for Le Havre at 7 arrived in Paris at 3. Found all well, arranged a meeting for tomorrow evening at Madame Bentz.
- Friday 14 Leon Fauchie and earlier are turned out of their offices - all right - Called upon Mr Dubois and Mr Augé - agreed with Mr Augé to begin again on Monday revising my translation of the book of Mormon. Our meeting this evening was an interesting one - 3 strangers present who spoke of baptism.
- Saturday 15 Lost my purse today with 12 francs in it. It had my visiting cards in it with my address - lost it at the post office.
- Sabbath 16 Meeting at the House of Sister Bentz at 2 several strangers present another in the evening at my room. well attended.
- Monday 17 Mr Augé came today at 12 and we went to work on the Book of Mormon with renewed vigor.
- Tuesday 18 Mr Augé came at 10. Br<sup>r</sup> Bertrand came in a few minutes after and said with tears in his eyes that Caleb had turned him out of his office and that he was without resources. My joy was extreme for I knew that as long as he remained in that Newspaper Office (Communist) government would be criminal to us. But he looks only on the dark side of the picture and saw nothing but gravitation drawing him in the past. I then went to Mr Augé and told him the circumstances & that it would be my wish to let Elder Bertrand finish the Book of Mormon. We instantly saw the majority of it and bid me leave for a while with strong expressions of lasting esteem and friendship. This affair is glorious for the church as it removes Br<sup>r</sup> Bertrand from his present political associations and from politics of which he is full full. And now as he will devote his whole time to the church his mind will naturally draw towards the things of God. He never would have been worth anything to the church in 20 years if he had not been withdrawn from the political influences that surrounded him. All is well.

## Preparing for the first

- 1851 Elder Burtrand came at 10 past 8 A.M. and we went to work on my translation  
 November 4 the 10 of it. I hope his work will continue; he is an diligent writer.
- Wednesday In the evening we had the visit of Mr. Bangsier. He was formerly a Catholic priest,  
 19 then a bominian, then became an atheist. Then a preacher in a church that was  
 broken off some 20 years ago from the Roman Catholic. where he still remains.  
 He is a man of great learning and talents, but a drunkard. He enjoyed with  
 pleasure to all I told him. I preached to him on the coming forth of the 10 of Mormon.
- Thursday At the usual meeting this evening at Madame Bentz's a devilish spirit ruled upon a  
 20 man. A stranger and used every artifice to interrupt, confuse & put an end to the  
 meeting. While singing "Alleluia has us chants" the spirit seized upon him, threw  
 him from his chair and he fell like lead upon his back at full length when the choir  
 singing "Bless me dear". I immediately called on all to pray with me. and I prayed  
 with great fervor. I awoke the Lord to drive from our midst every spirit that was not  
 of him and to make that spirit manifest. I called on this burtrand to speak. His  
 commences speaking on the coming of Christ and his personal reign on the earth, and  
 after a moment or so mentioned the 10. the spirit suddenly quit me in tones of bitter  
 anguish "Oh, don't speak of these people" repeated a number of times. Mr. Burtrand could  
 not proceed, could not understand this spirit, has not seen anything like it before. Dad  
 did not know that his father gave him power and authority over it. I then said  
 one having the spirit of God ruling powerfully upon me I proceeded to expel this  
 evil spirit and make it manifest before them all. I have known it was not of  
 God, but of the enemy of all righteousness. All in the room saw the countenance of man  
 remarks. Though at first all thought it was of God. Madame Bentz was delighted  
 with that spirit and was sure it was of God. I spoke with great boldness and handed  
 the spirit without flattery. I then spoke at some length to the man, exhorting  
 him not to let that devilish spirit control him, but by pray & fasting to restrain it  
 and drive it from his body or it would destroy his body. I then said "But enough now  
 that subject I want to speak of the coming of Christ" As the words left my mouth,  
 the man uttered a wild howl sprang from the floor when he had been laying all that  
 time on his back and made no part remain for his head. saying repeatedly  
 "I can't stay here I must go" And as he was going out the door, as if in answer to  
 what I had said about that spirit being of the evil, and also in coming to leave  
 an influence in his favor behind him and thus does God have salvation. He  
 said "No brother, you shall know by a vision in the night whether this spirit is of  
 God or Satan" I told him that was not sufficient as I knew already it is of the evil.
- The meeting was then quiet enough and all paid great attention while I spoke  
 on the coming of Christ. After the meeting one came forward for baptism 4. 2  
 more talking about it.
- Friday I had no vision according to the prophecy of the devilish spirit. He could prophesy  
 21 that I should have the vision in the night, but could not have power to send the  
 vision.
- Saturday I have had 2 or 3 visions very light within a few days. Neither can tell me  
 22 in order to obtain from him vobis at the same account he lets the preachers  
 of France have them.
- Sabbath Walker out to Lile & Dau baptised a man, returned about 4 hrs making at  
 23 2 at Madame Bentz's. And in the evening bite making and partook of the sacrament  
 in my room. several strangers present.
- November Gave copy for another "Book" and some of the book of Mormon to the painter  
 24 who to Mr. Park Yeart Bellanger Bellard according to the directions of Elder  
 Taylor, enclosing them of a conference to be held by Elder Taylor in Paris the 20 December  
 and in Jersey the 26 December.
- December Elder Burtrand and I were quietly working and consulting book of Mormon. Mr.  
 Tuesday Louis Baker came in and said the people were making barricades in the streets  
 2 High Paris is in revolt. Elder Burtrand became very pale, & trembled all over  
 the baker said that Louis Bonapart had entered the "Salle du national" about 2  
 o'clock in the morning with his troops drove out the representatives and kept

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December second session of the Hall. That many of the representatives had been fired  
 2 and murdered. Some had got together elsewhere and had declared the  
 president "not law"; that is - that only one has the right to kill him. So here  
 was a fuss on hand. Understanding that the President had issued a proclamation  
 I went out and found one plastered up and read it - He offers very  
 few in assurance. He appeals to the whole nation by a universal vote  
 to say whether he has done right or not. I am an American, accustomed to  
 settle all such questions at the ballot box could see no cause for an insurrection.  
 Troops are pouring into Paris in every direction. There was danger for  
 Mr. Lebrun & he was some years ago one of the head men of the revolution  
 any party of the republicans - connected with Lebel's communist newspaper.  
 but he has seen the utter folly of their principles more than a year ago.  
 He has been chosen by the people a member of the revolutionary committee  
 and was a marked man. He was imprisoned 3 months in 1848, mainly  
 for his opinions. On account of his safety we concluded to leave Paris for  
 a day or two - which we did at 4 o'clock. Fighting had commenced in  
 Paris. The streets are full of dismal looking faces.

Wednesday 3 Visited the ancient church of Saint Denis where the kings and queens  
 are buried. The man who shows us about took a great fancy to us and  
 said we many parts never shown much to strangers. Could hear no news  
 from town.

Thursday 4 Hearing no news from Paris, only that all appeared quiet, we left our pretty  
 little retreat at 4 AM and arrived in town about 1 - saw men leading horses  
 with the harness on whose wagons had been taken to make barricades. There  
 was no every convenience. And but little circulation of wagons. We hurried  
 on - bought bread in and arrived at home in safety. I had just sat down and  
 was to work translating & correcting the Bo. M. a most horrid hillard that  
 was almost tangible, suddenly came over the usual noise of a great city,  
 this earth shone ten minutes, when suddenly it was broken by an internal  
 roar of artillery and pieces flying in every direction; this lasted about  
 1/2 an hour and then followed that same horrid hillard really awful.  
 It was truly a solemn moment, but relying entirely on the arm of Jehovah  
 for protection. I went on translating and correcting without allowing my  
 mind to be in the least disturbed. The Lord said "The wicked must play the wicked"  
 so it was none of my business. But my soul was penitent in real prayer to  
 God who sent me here that no harm might fall me or any one of the  
 little flock he had given me. Towards evening I learned that the first of  
 the massacre by the troops was on the boulevard Montmartre, between St.  
 Asaph & the church called St. Denis. all done by my researches. And I learned  
 also that the fight was ended. For the President had withdrawn his first  
 order to make every man put his name on the book and his wife and with  
 yes - or no for or against him opposite their names, which certainly  
 was tyranny of the very worst description. He has issued this noon another  
 decree granting secret voting - no one to know how a man votes. This  
 satisfies the people and the fight is over for this time.

Friday 5 I remained in my room today. I am told the troops are mostly  
 withdrawn from the city. The number of troops is estimated at over 15,000  
 All the principal leaders of parties, and men of any political influence,  
 especially the members of the assembly are hunted & forced out everywhere  
 and thrown into prison, or driven out of the country. Some - are - but -  
 its certainly one of the surest ways to have peace; silence all opposition &  
 the most lasting way to silence a man is to cut his throat - that ends it -

Saturday 6 Walked about the city today, to form an idea of how a sacked city  
 looked. It was a dismal spectacle. I saw signs of barricades. The  
 houses on the south side of the boulevards above named, where reside  
 the wealth and respectability of Paris are literally peppered with marks

1851 and cannon balls. one house is nearly battered down by cannon - a most  
December called for inhuman bloody massacre took place on these boulevards. The  
troops were halting - this had called to the windows men women & children  
innocent & helpless confiding in the troops for protection - at a signal given  
the troops leveled and fired into the windows massacring in cold blood  
Thousands of these innocent - this was the flat-on firing I heard on Thursday.  
It is beyond the power of language to describe my sensations as I gazed upon  
this scene - The 33 regiment of infantry fired a mother of 7 children large  
in the family away she had several knives at her possession - they stood  
her out and shot her - French soldiers did that not Indians - The Lord says  
he has doomed a consumption upon the whole earth and I think the 33 are  
equipped with the right spirit to do their share in the latter day work.

- Sabbath Met with my little flock this afternoon - found all well - Thanks be to  
our heavenly Father. Our hearts were full of thanksgiving.
- Saturday Baptised ~~100~~ more to day. Mr Beantz and Fontenay. Mr Fontenay is  
15 a rare man, quiet firm, straight forward, honest, sober, industrious. an acquisi-  
tive to the church.
- Tuesday Elder Taylor arrived this evening from Hamburg having left Paris just  
16 2 months ago. He has got the Book of Mormon under way in German  
and has left there his P.Dykes President of the German mission. He has come  
according to agreement to hold a conference here on the 20. Mr Turley  
insisted on Elder Taylor taking up his abode at his house which he did.
- Friday Elder Hart arrived today from Haarre. Elder Taylor received a letter  
19 from Elder Park stating that when his arrival at Calais from Jersey his  
friends advised him not to attempt to come to Paris - in fact that government  
would not allow him to come - But he must have supposed Elder Taylor  
would come otherwise why did he add in a letter to him at Paris - I have  
since learned that this was a miserable subterfuge - Some months since  
before the council in Jersey composed of about 20 elders, priests, teachers &  
deacons he openly taught the plurality of wives - and declared that those  
who wrote not believe on this doctrine would go to hell. Now when  
he reached Calais he was seized with trembling for fear Elder Taylor would  
get to Jersey as soon as he - and find out his eminency before he had a  
chance to beg every body not to tell on him - so back he went in  
all haste to Jersey called a grand council of men and women, denied  
he had ever taught such doctrine - and said anybody who did believe in it  
would go to hell. So you'll be damned if you don't and you'll be damned  
if you see - and he cut off very many from the church - in consequence -  
and had left Jersey for England on his way to the Valley before Elder Taylor  
got to Jersey. I learned all this when I was in Jersey from many of the deacons
- Saturday 20 In consequence of the extreme jealousy of the Police on account of the  
unsettled state of Political affairs Elder Taylor decided to hold the conference  
in secret, having only the officers of the church present. As Elder Taylor  
carried away the minutes with him to the valley I can only give a word or 2.  
I was appointed president of the French mission. Elder Bush and was ordained  
a High Priest and appointed my first counselor and president of the Paris  
conference. Elder Hart was ordained a High Priest appointed president of the  
Haarre conference. Mr Bonnes was ordained an Elder. We were in session  
from 10 AM to 11 PM. And received much glorious instruction from Elder  
Taylor. Elder Hart took the minutes in short hand.
- Sabbath 21 This is the great day for the universal vote for or against the acts of the President  
Elder Taylor decided this morning to leave town by the 18th train for Haarre  
on his way to Jersey to hold a conference. As the morning advanced he &  
became more and more restless and anxious to have him out of Paris. He  
had given some linen to be washed & we were expecting it every minute and  
getting more and more uneasy. At last at 10 Minutes before 12 we could

1851 Stand the urgings of the Spirit no longer. I went off and hired a cab and  
1852 After 5<sup>o</sup> I got in and were driving off when we met Mrs. Dague with  
December the liven. The perspiration rolling off of him. Now we were only 10 or  
January 12 minutes drive from the R Road and yet started one hour before the time  
and was it not 3<sup>o</sup> of an hour at the R R office. I left Mrs. Taylor at 5 minutes  
before ten o'clock with tears a heart full - I never felt more utterly alone in all  
my life. Mrs. Taylor had rolled off of him on to my shoulders the whole burden  
of the French audience and had left me. She was going to the valley. I should  
be deprived of his godlike counsels and assistance. I stood alone. Oh God protect  
me. Be thou with me. or take me to thyself. for without thee I am nothing.  
One can do nothing right. Oh god grant wisdom, thy greatest gift, unto thy servant.

Munday 22 Arrived early this morning, a message from Mr. Ward-Bicknell saying he was  
inviting anxious to see me at once. Accordingly I went in all haste to his  
house. I found him quite sick. Lying in bed. He told me Mrs. Taylor and I  
had not been gone from his house yesterday more than 10 minutes at the  
most, when a person belonging to the "hair police" (such being a proper Police  
whose especial business is to ferret out political offenders) called at his house &  
examined Mr. Taylor under suspicion of his being a political communistic  
He asked hundreds of questions about Mrs. Taylor, his friends &c. all which  
Mr. Bicknell and Madame Lenoir, his aunt, answered bearing a bold & faithful  
testimony in his favor. But there was scarce such a man living for goodness. They  
watched the cloth with the greatest anxiety and longing for it to strike 1 - when  
they knew Mrs. Taylor would be gone. And they kept up the conversation until  
then. and then let the man go. Their hearts full of gladness at the escape of Mrs.  
Taylor. Let be thanked and praise for his deliverance from those who sought him.

Tuesday 24 As a measure of precaution I called upon the american ambafacer today  
who said he has no idea I merits to interfere. I told him I should most certainly  
stand on his protection. I have brought it prudent to hold no more meetings  
only a few of us get together to partake of the sacrament. It is not safe. But  
we are pushing the rock of Mormon with all force.

Sunday 28 At a meeting held this evening at the House of Mr. Finkenauer, after much  
opposition, Jean Baptiste Wilhelm was cut off from the church. Jerome Hubert  
voting in favor of Wilhelm. saying we were too hasty. and for a few moments all  
except 2 Mr. & Mrs. Finkenauer said as he did. Now V<sup>t</sup> Mrs. Taylor had offered  
me to cut Wilhelm off the FIRST meeting after conference. he said so during  
conference in presence of Elmer Burkhardt & Taylor yet they also joined in with  
the spirit of opposition. 2<sup>o</sup> Wilhelm has not been to meeting & to do any of  
us for over 3 months although living near. 3 Elmer Burkhardt & Dague have  
labored with him several times. And they Taylor wrote twice he say he was  
in Paris and would like to see him. to which he paid no attention. In and  
lastly he said himself he could no longer walk with us. Spun out to  
the saints the danger of tampering with Wilhelms spirit. that it would enter  
into them and they would fall away.

1852 January 1 spent a mournful happy evening with the Vanlenbrouck family as a  
Tuesday 6 parting feast. They leave on the 8<sup>th</sup> m<sup>o</sup> for the Valley of the great s. lake  
spent the evening in my room with his family. They are in excellent  
spirits - and full of hope. I have given them letters of introduction for  
persons in St. Louis, New Orleans, the Bluffs. and to Mr. Bingham  
& others in the valley. God bless them & protect them. May they never regret  
what they have done. God be with them for ever. Amen.

Wednesday 7 Went to the Haven hotel road early the morning and bid farewell to  
the Vanlenbroucks. the first fruits of France - They take ship at Havre for  
m<sup>o</sup> come together to the valley. I do love Matilda for her innocent, amiable,  
quiet, lovely ways. And I rejoice to know that I have robbed France of one of

1852 her brightest and most beautiful jewels - her sweetest budding rose transplanted  
Grazing into the garden of the Lord Jesus Christ. Long may it flourish and bloom and  
never be rooted out and thrown aside. Mr. Ducloux sent a present of books  
to the Valley University. Mr. Vanu took charge of them.

I wrote to G. P. Dykes at Hamburg.

Friday 9 Spent the evening with Mr. Ducloux at Mr. Oliver's former vice president  
of the Swiss Diet - had only his lady - he was out. She is a very benevolent  
lady and is trying to contrive some means of emigration for the suffering  
poor so as to ameliorate their condition. She says that to get them and  
let them are leave them here is of no earthly use. It has to be repeated over  
and over - it does not better their condition. I explained to her the gospel our  
situation in the Valley and the working of the perpetual fund which pleases her.  
What a wretched position the old worn out nations of Europe are in - all in a  
fitter - all preparing for war. The people have no confidence in the governments  
and the governments have none in the people - all is confusion, all is treachery  
From past with many clay. All is mishap and hatred and desire for change -  
the new places are filled with wars & rumors of wars. iniquities and abominations  
of every sort. Seduction and child murder most frequent. The seducer goes  
in - no one ever thinks to enquire "who made the child" who took advantage of  
the warm tender hearted girl full of love - full of confiding. No, the law Siecks  
the deserted girl who to hide her shame and not to be cast out of society, destroys  
the life she has given - and she is hung - the man, unknown and uncared for  
is left loose to prepare others for the gallows. Oh curse such a creature.

The spirit of gathering or I should say of emigration is getting a hold in this country  
in consequence of political persecution.

Saturday 10 Went and called upon the chef de Bureau of the minister of the interior M  
de Moray to make a declaration that I was about to publish a paper called  
the Star of David (L'etoile du David) He said I cannot publish a paper in France  
because I am a Foreigner. I then entered into an explanation of the nature  
of the paper. He said I might get a friend a Frenchman in whom I have  
confidence, to assume the ownership. Or if I can't do that. I must call it a book  
to come out in numbers or a year at so much a number. After a  
lengthy conversation I left him one called on Mr. Ducloux who was rapidly  
effed to assume the ownership and responsibility and said I need trouble  
myself no more he would go and make all right. he is intimate with the chef  
de Bureau and will have influence with him.

Claude Daquin has made up his mind to go to London as there is nothing doing here  
this will be quite a loss for me - I am so happy in his house. few women on  
earth are equal to Sister Daquin in goodness and greatness of soul.

Tuesday 11 The printer commenced striking off the Book of Mormon by steam today -

12 The sheets look beautiful. I am delighted with the type and paper etc.

Wednesday 13 Minutes to 11 A.M. - the last stroke of the pen is done to the last revision of  
the Book of Mormon. This is the 3<sup>rd</sup> time it has been written entirely through  
just by myself, all alone, then by Mr. Augé who wrote after my dictation. I  
keeping my original before me - then finally to make a clean copy and  
correct the French. It has truly been a most laborious, arduous, difficult  
task for me for I have had to use men who know nothing of our ecclesiises, and  
were wrong at every step. I had to have an eye of the eagle over them unceasing  
ly - and it was almost impossible to combat the follies and weakness of the French  
language. Each many phrases they could not see the force and importance of  
and would abandon the page for a hasty turned phrase.

Thursday 14 P.M. The last page of the Book of Mormon is in type. And that is one  
glorious work done - Thank the Lord.

Friday 22 While at the printers to day reading proof. I was taken suddenly and severely ill  
23 of a kind of cholera called choleric - took a carriage & hastened home 3 miles.

1852

January  
Saturday  
24

I had a cold severe night of it. By the blessing of God and the great attention of Mr & Sister Barnes I am better this morning. I was rapped so bad they were obliged to hole me. It brought on by insistant toil early and late and without regular meals. For the past 3 months I have scarce once been able to get to bed before 1 o'clock A.M. I gave copy yesterday for "Saff" Steele.

Tuesday  
27

A committee of the police called today accompanied by two agents of police to enquire about what Elder Barnes was doing. Elder B was terribly frightened. This very morning, I had coaxed and counseled Elder B to write to this very same committee to say that he was no longer a political but a religious man. He acted accordingly, but the committee had not yet received the letter. I spoke boldly and faithfully to the committee so much so that he was astounded not being accustomed to it. I told him every had turned Elder B away because he was opposed to him in politics. At one time the man commanding asked me if I was at home. I told him yes all the time.

Wednesday  
28

Mr. Duroux refuses to allow the S. W. of M. in French to be sold at his book store. He says he is forced to this measure because of his intimate communion with the leading Protestants. They threaten him hard. I told him all right, but it is really miraculous to me how my way is everlastinglly hedged up against spreading the truth. I have very often been tempted to think that the Lord has no people in this City of horrible abomination.

Thursday  
29

Bent off 100 Books of Mormon to elder Taylor at Liverpool. I received 60 at my room. I had all sorts of trouble to find a conveyance for the 100.

Sunday  
February  
1

Waked at meeting this evening that some of the saints have been dreaming of here & comes he. Found a spirit of tattling among the saints.

Monday  
2

I preached very sharp and warning them that it would lead them to destruction if they would not obey the gospel. The evil should come alive and she should live. She said she would. From thence I went to Mr. Duroux 4 miles and ordered the Stereotype of the S. W. It packed in 3 strong boxes and sent to I. Perl as I had a hint that the feds were tampering with government to have them seized. I sent off 200 Books of Mormon to the Liverpool office and not to Jersey. And I received 200 more at my room.

Mr. Duroux informs me that the State Council (consist of that) have had the S. W. of M. their under consideration & never had it before them for the last 6 days and every time Mr. Duroux's men calls for it, they tell him to come "tomorrow" or "next day". They must certainly have found a mark just. One thing is certain they are daily puzzled about it for the minister of the interior upon whom I called about it some days since said "It is not a newspaper". The Post master says it is a news paper and advised me to put the 10 cent stamp upon it then I can send it by the post free of postage. and that I must have it stamped because its a newspaper.

The Post master cultures it is not a news paper and that he wont receive it as such stamp or no stamp. Now if I put on the stamp to make it go through the Post. I should also have to put the date at the top of the paper and that would constitute it a paper & it would help the Post he. But then again if I put the date at top I then have to give 10 cent paper security and moreover get a gentleman to take the ownership. So then he said a "fitter about (the)" never mind it will stand on when they are dead and damned.

 Feb 3 Tuesday Packed 24 B of M this morning and 10 of each of the first 7 numbers of the "étoile" making 70 and sent them to Geneva to Mr. Steinhouse. Then went to Mr. Daclouy's. No reply yet from the Government about the "étoile". I fail to place the matter in the hands of the Lord and all will be well. - gave copy for the Q<sup>th</sup> of the "étoile".  
 Baptized 2 French at 5 o'clock - a cold windy day. Claude Beaudet of Paris  
 Sunday 8  
 Tuesday 10 The censor has at length returned the paper leaving streets out 12 lines, being extracts from the prophecies of Isaiah, and nothing else. Received 10 £ 10s from Br<sup>r</sup> Taylor. gave Br<sup>r</sup> B - 60 francs and wrote home. Rec'd newspaper from Washington containing Judge Broder's report. and Dr. Berlilius's reply.
- Wednesday 11 Dic up and forwarded news papers "étoile" everywhere.  
 Home Lebreron son of Mr. Joseph Lebreron of Haute Savoie. When I lived with his father in Haute he was about 3 and 6 years old a very beautiful child. and always spent his evenings with me. Became again to day such a change for the worse. He is now 26 years old and has the appearance of a man used up with women & wine - He asked me to lend him 20 francs which I did.  
 Joseph Taranto of the Italian Mission came this morning at 7 o'clock from Turin on his way to the Valley. He came in the company with one from the valley. He was ~~strangely~~ really and truly and was so weak his mind was entirely gone; He had wild, strange notions that the Devil had full possession of him etc. As I resolved right away to feed him on the fattest, he had an idea he must fast and pray or this spirit would overcome him -
- Sunday 22 Had a delightful meeting this evening near a dozen strangers present who were all attentive and forward well pleased. Joseph Taranto left this day at 1 P.M. for London I gave him 20 francs and an overcoat and some other clothing. had the
- Tuesday 24 Council meeting this evening of the brethren.
- Wednesday 25 Rec'd a letter from Br<sup>r</sup> Taylor, and an hour after received one from Friend B Young, which had a sentence in it appearing to be a recall to my family. I at once wrote to Br<sup>r</sup> Taylor and sent him the letter. and asked his advice -
- Friday 27 Had a pleasant visit from Mr. Bandelier a protestant minister. I asked him if he would here in his chappel. he said it was in the hands of a committee but that he would prep the demand for us before the committee. this chappel is very small. holds perhaps a hundred. I presented him the B of M. and taught him the acknowledging all I taught to be true.
- Thursday 14 March an elderly lady Mademoiselle Dray called. has an excellent spirit - she bought a Book of Mormon and the "étoile".
- Saturday 16 March Another elderly lady Mademoiselle Mandat. died today and went

about 4 hours. She is deating. Desires to send young children to the Valley of the great Salt Lake, and came to see me about it. I promised to write to Elder Taylor for her. She gave 10 francs for trouble and postages.

Sabbath  
March 7

The past week has been one of considerable anxiety to me. every day until 1 P.M. I have been expecting a letter from Elder Taylor telling me what to do, whether to return to the Valley this year or not. It keeps me in suspense not hearing from him. And I don't know what to do. Sister Beatty and her husband not having a right spirit. I called all the church together this evening and talked very plain and sharp to them.

Tuesday  
2 March

Mr. Dubourg being about to visit London I wrote a few lines by him to Elder Taylor begging him to answer my former letter.

Tuesday  
March 9

Mr. Dubourg has returned but I have rec<sup>d</sup> no letter. He says the brethren in London assured him Elder Taylor had sailed for the United States on the 6<sup>th</sup>. Well, if so, and he received my former letter then he has not done right by me at all in not answering me. I am not willing to sholder the responsibility of his silence to President Young. If Bro' Young meant his letter for a recall and I do not obey, then I shoult not expect to be blessed in my mission and ministry. Yet I wish to be subject to Elder Taylors council. I cannot think of one individual in the church capable of replacing me here in Paris - in public preaching perhaps yes - but not in the publications. I am most anxious to return and most anxious to do exactly right if I could only tell what right is - and yet I feel a thought cannot be spared from here. Bro' Brigham said "use your earliest convenience to return home" what may be considered my convenience. Well the doors will be open.

Wednesday  
10<sup>th</sup> March

The suspense being intolerable to me I wrote again to Liverpool enclosing the letter to Elder Taylor. My anxiety to do right was upon me so that my friends say I have given 10 years over since a couple of weeks. Sleep has left me. Wilkinson is a horrid state.

Thursday  
11

I have written to day to Elder F. D. Richards at Liverpool begging him to counsel me in the absence of Elder Taylor. I have laid the matter plainly before him.

Saturday  
13

I have spent two days trying to find out a plan to send the books to London but without avail. The post office won't receive them only as letters. and as I want to send but 10 copies a month it is too much to have to pay 5 francs a bundle to send them per rail road. The London Book store have ordered that number but I cannot send them by any conveyance I have yet discovered.

Thursday  
16

I have at length set letters just as my suspense was becoming too intolerable to bear. It was on the eve of leaving for Liverpool when the letter arrived. There were three letters

one from Dr. Franklin D. Richards one from Rev<sup>r</sup> W. Richards and one from Dr<sup>r</sup> James Luforth. They desire me to remain yet another year in the service of the Lord, as president of the Church here, and that this is the will of the Lord. So I am content and happy again - as a son always is, when he is right.

Sat down and wrote letters home, to say I would remain another year. Wrote to Dr<sup>r</sup> Brigham Young giving reasons why I do not return this year. Wrote to Cyrus H. Wheelock, for him to pay Mr. Dunlop 1000 francs.

The article having appeared in a religious newspaper called "L'Amis du Christianisme", I sent a letter to the editor to say to request him to allow me room in his paper for an answer. He is a protestant minister, the paper has an extensive circulation throughout Europe.

April  
1  
Thursday

See an answer to my letter to the Editor (Frederick Monod) requesting permission in a polite way for me to put a piece in his paper. After considerable search have found a comfortable room at No. 7, Rue de Tourneuil, where Bo<sup>r</sup> Taylor and I lived as long as he was in Paris. Bo<sup>r</sup> R. Squire has concluded to remain in Paris, and has had to find up another dwelling - he has one but too contracted for me to live with them. The best they could find.

It is now 9 months since I have heard from my wife.  
Gave copy for another "Etoile".

April  
2  
Friday

I have now but 20 francs and that is perpetual fund money. I have written to F. D. Richards to know what I am to do for money, to support me here - naming my present situation.

See this afternoon a letter from Cyrus H. Wheelock inviting me to London to a general council, where I will see him and Bo<sup>r</sup> Richards, and then have a chance to talk over matters. The council begins Monday evening.

Saturday  
3

Got my passport signed for myself and a little girl 3 years old whom Bo<sup>r</sup> Squire was hoping to adopt, but her disposition is such that Sister Squire would be if the child remain with her. And as the child is extremely fond of me, Bo<sup>r</sup> Squire wants me to take her to London to her relations Bo<sup>r</sup> Hubert and Fontenay came this evening and took away a load of my books, clothing, flowers &c. Left the 10 Number of the "Etoile" in the hands of Bo<sup>r</sup> Bertrand to finish and forward - it is to be ready

Sunday  
4<sup>th</sup>

Monday - Advised no particular meetings until my return  
After tears of distress on the part of the saints and the dear little Mary Jane Bourdoux and even myself, I bid them adieu for a few days - and took the rail road for Boulogne. The dear little Mary Jane was delightful company for me - and no more trouble than a little kitten. She had her little arm around my neck almost all the way to Boulogne. She hugged and kissed me often, she has been my little pet for more than a year. In fact all children love me. And I will say this once that I bear this testimony of my self that I have won the love and esteem of every body I have come in contact with on this mission - It is not me they love - but its the spirit I am of, which is a spirit of love the spirit of God - the spirit of kindness - of commiseration - of endearment Oh how different from what has been known of me in years that are past when I have been in Hell on account of . . . but never

April

mind is past and gone. I have passed through the worst of trials which soured my temper -

Arrived at Boulogne at 8 - leaving Paris at 1 - At 10 the steam boat got under way for London. I had lain little Mary Jane in the birth and she went fast to sleep - but almost immediately upon our leaving the dock she was taken sea sick and I took her in my arms and ran up on deck with her and just walked the deck with the little love til morning. She vomiting all the time every 5 minutes at least - at 5 we were in the Thames and the boat was smoothly along - I then put her in the bed and she slept sound till 7 past 8. when we were along side the dock at London Bridge. We then had to wait 2 hours for our baggage. I then took a cab to 35 Jervin St the L G J Book Store - where Sister Armstrong washed and cleaned Mary Jane - and I then took another cab and drove to Mary Jones Unites, in New Road.

I there met John Squire - Sister Robt Squires brother. I left the child with the greatest difficulty - She clung to my neck with her little hot cheek against mine and nothing could coax her away from me til I sat down and began to play a piano - She then got down and went to play with her cousins in the room - I seized an opportunity when her little head was down among the rest to slip out - and accompanied John to his house 18 Clarendon Square near St Pancras church. and took dinner with him - After dinner John's wife got so uneasy that she had to go over and see how the child was. She found her crying bitterly because she could not find me. She therefore took her and brought her to me. Poor little dear it seemed as if she went faint with joy when she saw me. She did not know how to act. She clasped her little arms around my neck and kissed me incessantly while her little cheeks were sometimes white as marble and sometimes red as carnation.

Towards evening I got her to sleep and laid her upon the sofa took supper at Johns and then went to the Hall in ~~Wadsworth~~ Wadsworth's boat where the conference was to commence at 7 o'clock. The room was crowded to overflowing - Br<sup>o</sup> Marsden presiding - being President of the London Conference - All the American brethren were there - Br<sup>o</sup> F D & S Richards - Cyrus H Wheelock - Dorr P Curtis felt Campbell - Bob Smith - James Works - Jacob Gates - Jos W Young & Dan Richards. Don't recollect any others. Elder Marsden called on me first to speak - I gave some little account of my mission and the actual situation of Political events in France - After speeches from the most of the brethren we separated at a late hour - I went home with Br<sup>o</sup> G V Long to Br<sup>o</sup> Waddington's 41<sup>st</sup> Coleman Street

Today  
10  
Tuesday

I have just a week of absence. Elder Richards and Wheelock had promised ever since Monday evening that at the first leisure moment they would consult with me about affairs in France - whether I could hope to receive anything from England to help sustain the french mission. The week has been spent in Council - every day from 10 till 1 to 4 & 1/2 past 9 P.M. and this morning it was 4 & 1/2 before we commenced separating; and it was 7 before I got to bed. I slept til 12 - then went

to the book store to see Elders Richards and Wheelock - found that Elder Wheelock had left without giving me an audience - toward evening Mr. Richards asked me to state my position - I told him I was owing for the publication of the B. & M. and "chose" over £6 £<sup>10</sup> - that I myself had been living on borrowed money for over a month expecting every day a remittance which Elder Taylor had promised. He said they had raised in England very much money for the French & German Missions just before Elder Taylor left - and that many conferences were now in debt from £0 to £50 £<sup>10</sup> each for money they had borrowed and presented to Elder Taylor for the French Mission. Elder Richards said that he himself has given 300 francs for the French Mission. I told him as to myself Elder Taylor never has furnished me a cent himself - except what he took again out of money raised for me in England - that I have spent as little money as any Elder - that has been sent out from the Valley - and that I have worn out all my outer and underclothes - and no means to obtain more. That Elder Taylor made no arrangements whatever for my being sustained in France before he left. He mentioned not a word of it and had left the £<sup>14</sup> £<sup>10</sup> at the brothers' expense - we left one penny less - and the poor saints in Paris too poor to supply the necessary means for my expenses. Elder Richards said Elder Taylor told him the French Mission would only want £<sup>25</sup> £<sup>10</sup> more and would then be out of debt and able to sustain itself. And that Elder Taylor ought to know and therefore England wrote so no more - I asked him if he would return here when to go to my post in Paris. He then gave me £<sup>1</sup> £<sup>10</sup> and we separated. I feel wear, weary, weary - I feel as though I would like to rest from my labors - I am weary - both mind and body -

Sunday  
11

Went up this morning to 18 Clarendon Square to see the little Mary Jane Bowden - Poor little angel how she has cried after me and pines away. But little many I wish I could take her for my own daughter but it is utterly out of the question. I managed to pacify her by telling her I was only going to church and would see her again after a while. I then went to Theobald road Chapel and preached in the afternoon and again in the evening - good attentive congregations - Oh what a contrast with my situation in Paris. Here I can meet the brethren in large numbers and preach both long and loud, but in Paris we had to meet a few in a place secretly and not speak above one's breath. This contrast has cost me many tears while here in London.

Monday  
12

Being invited to a tea meeting in the Finsbury quarter of the City I concluded to remain another day - In the evening at about 6 P.M. Washington and I went to the place of meeting where we met 2 or 3 of the American brethren and some other good fellows - The evening was passed in speeches and songs and eating cakes nuts, raisins, oranges, figs, apples, biscuits It was a most joyful meeting - We separated at a late hour - but I went home with Mrs Dray, Sister Dray is

confined to her bed - and has been for years.

Wednesday  
14

Left London this morning at 5. arrived at about 1 at St. Mamm's town  
Went to the meeting there. What a change in this branch  
all is division and coldness - when all was union and love a year ago  
My spirit was stupefied. I left by the steamer at 6 P.M. having  
visited many of the members -

Thursday  
15

Arrived in Havre at 7. having had the quietest passage I ever knew  
not a ripple. Went to Crede's Hotel took my breakfast  
and then started in search of Elder Hyde, president of that branch.  
Found him. sat healthy & happy. Went with him to visit all  
the saints. found all well and full of love and union.  
had a delightful happy meeting in the evening.

Friday  
16

Another happy day spent with the saints here - and another  
delightful meeting. We held a conference - and obtained two sons  
of Sister Harris - Eugene H. an elder, Gustave H., a priest.

Saturday  
17

Mr. Horrocks came this morning to my bed room and took  
my hand and with tears in his eyes thanked God for the  
day. I entered first his house - said it had brought a great  
blessing to it. He has not been baptised for certain reasons.  
At 10 I left the beloved saints of Havre and got upon the  
Rail road en route for Paris. with a heavy heart and gloomy  
thoughts and a weary mind and body. I arrived in Paris at  
5 P.M. came here to my lodgings I had engaged before leaving Paris  
for London. Washed & cleaned and went to B<sup>r</sup>. Squires. found  
all pretty well. The "Story" had been working ever since  
I left and no one had sent them off. Bi Bertrand had  
obtained work and had not sent them as I expected him to do.

Sabbath  
18

Called the saints together this evening and spoke much to them of  
the necessity of being united. Several speak of baptism who have  
been several times to meeting - there are 5 or 6 of them.

Tuesday  
19

At our usual council meeting this evening I told the saints  
of my situation with regard to assistance from England to sustain  
me - they resolved to do what they can - to do away for the present  
with all other funds except the one for my support.

Wednesday  
20

Called upon Mr. Bandelier (a protestant minister) this evening  
and spent several hours with him. met there several of his friends  
The evening passed very pleasantly with Philosophy, &c.  
My health is very poor - a touch of the bronchitis, with an  
increasing cough day and night - I have felt it ever since I  
had to walk the deck of the steamboat with little Mary Jane Bodine  
when she was so very seasick.

Mr. Bandelier urged me to make a demand upon the Police  
for permission to have meetings in his chappel which he offers  
to rent to me 2 meetings a week for 25 francs for 3 months  
cheap enough in all conscience -

Thursday  
21

Spent the evening with a blacksmith at the Barrière Montreuil  
he and his wife are speaking of baptism. They appear good honest  
hearted people. Name Bertrand dit Florimond

Friday  
25

8 strangers present at our meeting this evening. Dr' Bertrand  
spoke too long after me - he tired us out.

No one can imagine what I suffer in mind to be thus suddenly  
deprived of the necessary means to carry on the work of the Lord in  
this country. My expenses <sup>were</sup> to be double I don't know but thrice of what  
they were; and yet I cannot expect a cent more than my food and  
lodging. I ought to hire a translator to help me with the "Étoile"  
as Dr' Bertrand cannot - or else the "Étoile" must cease to shew.  
How am I to pay him - The "Étoile" costs about 25 francs each time  
now more than it pays. And if I have to pay a translator it will  
cost that much more again. The Lord must provide.

Tuesday  
May 26

After a great deal of trouble I have at length been able to  
get a letter written to the Minister of Police demanding an interview  
and posted it this evening. We are having frost almost  
every night - it is cold blustery March weather. It has not  
rained upon any part of France or England since over 2 months  
until today it rains here at Paris

Thursday  
6

Held a meeting at Barrière Montreuil, a new place, the room  
was crowded; a most excellent spirit reigns; there asked for baptism  
and others speak of it. It is some time since I so much rejoiced in  
a meeting of strangers. All were exceedingly attentive and  
appeared deeply interested. I appointed Monday for baptism.

Saturday  
8

Called today upon the Minister of the Police - Maupas. Mr' Jules  
went with me - the Minister told me to take a hall and then make  
a declaration to the Commissary of that quarter of the city where the  
Hall is that we are going to hold meetings in - and send the  
minister a copy of it.

Monday  
10

I started from home at 12 past 8 o'clock and went straight to St Ouen  
where, after waiting about an hour the people began to assemble to  
the baptism. We found to our regret that our pretty little retired  
island was fenced so that we could not get to it. we made diligent  
enquiry to obtain permission to go to it but without success: so after  
a while we found another place nearly as good. And there after  
singing, praying & preaching I commenced baptising while the brother  
sang. I baptised 4 and then speaking a few words to another, he  
immediately prepared and I baptised him - Once for the purification of his  
sins and once for his health as he is very sick. Their names are  
the blacksmith Florimond and family and locksmith Vales - We  
had an excellent place to spell under a Mill - where we were hid  
completely - just as the baptism was done the minister Mr' Baudier  
his wife and a friend of his arrived - feeling bad enough that they  
were so late. There were many strangers present who all appeared  
delighted - it was so like ancient times - A most excellent spirit  
prevailed - I felt first rate - After singing we partook of a repast  
and then going in a boat to the steep bank of the river Seine where  
the grass was long and luxuriant we there took our seats, and  
after singing one of the delightful songs of Lion of Dr' Bertrands

May -

and offering up a short prayer I preached to a most attentive congregation, composed of saints, our friends and many strangers attracted by our singing - about 40 persons in all - I believed that this very earth is to be our eternal abode - which was received by a universal joy on the countenances of all - many of the strangers eyes danced in their heads and glistened with pleasure.

When I sat down I requested Mr Bandelier to speak if he felt like it - he did so - and spoke well - Then his friend spoke a little but with the real methodist tone (whang whang) and spirit - that to me was unpleasant and even ridiculous - we then sang again - and I said a few words, blessed the people and we then crossed the river and turned our faces homewards - about 30 of us in all - I preached in the evening at ~~Bost~~ Fontenay

Tuesday  
11

Officer directed the brethren to hunt for a hall - Br<sup>o</sup> Bertrand and I went to visit one this evening - 6 francs a night - as government have closed Mr Bandelier's meetings I dare not take his hall for fear they may say it is his meeting room and then forbid me too - the hall I went to see is the one Br<sup>o</sup> Taylor and I talked of taking - I have rec'd a letter from Capt Richards saying that he and Erasmus Snow, F & Richards & Mellock had held a council and decided that I shou'd have no help from England, may God reward them - I'll do what the Lord will let me - though it is hard -

Monday  
17

A most charming meeting this evening - there were several strangers present - Br<sup>o</sup> Squire and I laid our hands on those who have been baptized but Monday, the room was filled with the Spirit of God - I preached for near 1/2 an hour - then invited Mr Bandelier - Who bore a delightful testimony of his feeling on seeing this ancient ordinance - His friend then asked permission to speak I gave it, he found fault with us for not letting him partake of the bread and wine with us - Mr Bandelier asked my permission and replied for me - then Br<sup>o</sup> Squire arose & straightened it all out - he is a noble man - one of God's own.

As the Police has been to Br<sup>o</sup> Metzger taking the frame, and vocations where born &c of him and his family we considered it prudent to not hold any more meetings at his house - We therefore held our meeting this evening at Br<sup>o</sup> Squire's - in the same house where we living 3 priests - Morehead - and there is a gendarme living in the adjoining room - it was held -

there were 6 strangers present - Several speak of baptism - I confess <sup>my</sup> difficulties, trials, creases dangers, privations &c I have endured on this mission. I could fill books with the description of what I have to endure and contend with, in the way of money affairs - governmental affairs - books, publishing - choir - correspondence - writing letters and then copying them - Meetings 3 times a week 3:4.

May

15 miles off and a council meeting besides - making it necessary per week that I am up till 12. often very often too tired to sleep my strained ankle paining and burning so that I have to keep it out of bed on a chair - And often pass almost all night trying to make out ways and means to keep the work going here on its own resources - since the Presbytery in England have refused flatly to do anything more for the French Mission, most incomprehensible conduct it appears to me - Called on Mr. Cooke to get permission to conduct it appears to me -

Thursday  
20

*a clear sun*

I started this morning with Bo<sup>r</sup> Squire & his family and we went to St. Omer, there to meet those desirous of being baptized - After about 2 hours & spent in going to and fro and searching - we obtained permission to take a boat and go to our dear little quiet island. I was carried over, we were over 20 grown persons. We were then entirely alone, reclining on the long grass under the shade of some lofty trees on the banks of the Seine river. We there sang and prayed and preached and sang as long as we pleased, then I came forward and were baptized all adults. and after partaking of a repast we returned to town.

This makes us 34 myself included making 100 I have baptized in France 27 in Paris 13 in Havre (6 in Paris baptized by Elder Taylor) Rec'd a letter from my wife and from Elder Taylor a short note and a letter from Mr. Vanlambrouck who with others was at St. Omer

In the garden of the Luxembourg the orange trees are all put in their places in the walks - And the music has been begun 4 times a week from 7 past 6 to 8 P.M. There are about 50 musicians of various instruments. they make most delightful music.

Rain

Started at "l'hostel" full with Bo<sup>r</sup> Squire & family and went to the "Barriere du Trone" there we met Bo<sup>r</sup> Vale's and family and spent a most delightful afternoon and had a good dinner. It then began to rain. We then went to Mazing a few steps from the barriere where quite a number of Brethren & strangers had assembled - Bo<sup>r</sup> Squire & I laid on hands on 3 of the 8 baptized leaving the others for Monday evening at Bo<sup>r</sup> Ponteneau's A most delightful spirit pervaded the room - a spirit of union, love and peace & joy. We separated at a late hour full of thanks giving to our heavenly Father

Laid on hands with Bo<sup>r</sup> Squire on 4 more of the eight baptized it was a most glorious meeting the spirit and power of God was strong upon us - and filled the room and every one present then occupied writing letters to my wife and to Mr. Vanlambrouck on my Brother Jackson Bolton and my Cousin James Robert Bolton sent the following Poetry to my wife - being my own composition for the world - "from Dickens"

Farewell my fond and faithful friend

universal sickness prevously here since 2 or 3 weeks.

I have at last found a hall to meet in. A workman has  
offered his large empty "atelier" free of expense we have only  
to heat it. It is right among the workmen of Paris - Faubourg  
du Temple - near the old Bastile (destroyed in 1793)

Said on hand ~~on~~ this evening in meeting at B<sup>r</sup>. Fontaineau on the  
head of S<sup>r</sup>. Derby. B<sup>r</sup>. Spine being with me. I have always to be  
cautious as he cannot speak much french.

Put letters in the Post Office for wife, Jackson, James Blunt, Mr. Louis -  
Vanderbrouck. Held a council meeting this evening. a delightful

meet them all together - meeting to commence at 6. P.M. in our new  
hall - God permitting.

Dined & spent the evening with Mr. D'Alouys in a most agreeable talk etc  
in the course of the evening he invited for me the following letter  
to the commissioners of the Quarters where the Hall is  
Paris 3 June 1852 - Monsieur le Commissaire - Consulat du

We agreed to go to St. Owen on Monday afternoon, at 1 O'clock, 2 or 3 others speak of baptism - among the rest the wife of ~~Br<sup>o</sup>~~ Baudelot a protestant Minister. They both called upon me this morning and spent 3 hours with me when Mr<sup>o</sup> Baudelot asked for Baptism next Monday.

5

Rain

I passed the day writing off hymns for the anticipated meeting in public tomorrow. And in much meditation and prayer.

Sabbath

6

Rain

Glory to God on high - Praise the Lord O my soul - and all that is within me praise his holy name <sup>for it is great & his name is worth forever</sup> I this evening from 6 to 8 o'clock - All held our meeting in the New Hall - a goodly number of strangers present 20 or 30 - All was quiet and orderly - It had great liberty of speech, and curiously set forth man's true position on the earth. Why we do the resurrection etc. I alone conducted the meeting throughout - and intend to do so for some time to come. Thus ended our 1 st public meeting in Paris After our meeting was over there came on a most drenching rain. I took the omnibus at the Bastile and rode home.

See a note at 4<sup>th</sup> part of this Evening <sup>the 2nd</sup> article a list of the names of the members of the Church - I will send it home as soon as I get the address which I have not now.

Monday

7

Rain

At 11 still went to Mr<sup>o</sup> Squires to meet those who were to go with me to Saint Owen. At 1<sup>o</sup> to 12 Sister Fontenau came in and we (Mr<sup>o</sup> Squire & wife & I) saw at the first glance that something was wrong. She was exceedingly agitated more than the mere act of coming up stairs. after being seated a few moments, she said that Sister Bentz had come as far as the door and had turned back and said she would wait at the street door and not come up. Now this was done out of a spirit of hatred, envy, malice, and all uncharitableness towards Mr<sup>o</sup> & Sister Squire, than whom better, more kind affectionate people don't exist - who never laid a straw in Sister Bentz way or anybody else. But Sister Bentz has caused me more trouble with her harsh spirit and commanding uncontrollable spirit, causing sorrow, confusion, contention, and grief wherever she goes - and her living false ~~beloved~~ visions and revelations than all the rest of the ~~rest~~ put together. Sister Squire wanted to go down & coax her to come up and Sister Fontenau also - but I told them No I was determined that her evil spirit should be her own tormentor & she should wait until the cause of herself. As I did not expect the Br<sup>o</sup> of Sister Fontenau until 1 O'clock - and there was no chance for Sister Bentz to sit down at the door, and she had just come down about 3 miles or more - About half an hour after she came up like a fury - and wanted to begin on Sister Fontenau for having her so long at the door. I hoped her short asked her why she had not gone up with Sister Fontenau - Said that it was I who prevented the Sisters from going down on this ~~business~~ to

- 1852 June 7 bish her big toe and beg her to do what I did not care a straw whether she did or not - She I told her it was a bad spirit in her that prevented her from coming up freely and friendly as she ought to have done. She said it was & she had a bad spirit. This was too much to bear for she was running along a whole string of insolent intollerable angry language - I told her to quit it and that instantly and never let her open her mouth in such a strain again to me - after a few moments of silence Mr Squire and I commenced singing some of our beautiful soul stirring hymns. and continued until Sister Fontenac's brother arrived at 1 P.M. Then after a wet rainy day - I brother Junod and Sister Fontenac & ~~Betty~~ Betty Starkes for Dr C were where we were to meet the others. We took a boat and went on an artificial Island supporting the outside of a tide mill - moved by the current of the river - we were now several persons being met at 1 P.M. by the Rev Metzger. French - Mr Baudelot and his lady - 8 in all - We went under the mill and there had singing and prays. and then prepared for the ordinance of baptism - Only 2 had come it was such a rainy day and the distance great - I baptised Dr Junod and Sister Baudelot and laid on hands on Dr Junod at once - as his time was not his own. After a slight repeat we returned to town and I dined with Sister Fontenac as she was really sick from the effects of the scene at Dr Squires - However her husband and I laughed her out of such feelings and I left and arrived at my room at 10 P.M. Wrote to Dr Robert Campbell, Glasgow Scotland.
- Tuesday 8 Rain Drove rain notwithstanding which I went to our Hall to hold a council meeting. I was met to the skin - BUT few of the Brethren came to the council - So few that occupied the whole time in giving intelligence of the Bible prophecies.
- Wednesday 9 Rain Rec'd a letter from Sister Fontenac stating that her sister in law and her 2 sisters not members of the church were furious at the baptism of her Brother. And that her Brother was not allowed one moments repose from their howling day nor night - And that as he was most extremely sensitive he was likely to lose his reason. She begged me to try to see him and lay hands on him - She also informed me that a fellow here who preaches some kind of a doctrine called the established protestant Church of France had been urging these 3 crazy headed, exiled women to have me taken and cast into prison - The Preacher's name is Paul Brunier - cousin to the man who lives at Nevey in Switzerland who has been publishing all manner of lies about us in a pamphlet. I have met this man a number of times at Mr Dulac's He is furious because I have baptised some of his congregation & hope to baptise more. Upon the rec't of the above letter I immediately went to Dr Squires near where Dr Junod (the Dr of Sister Fontenac) is living. They

13

asked me on entering whether I had had the visit of three women - I told them no - they said that 3 women (the wife & 2 sisters of Br' Junod) had been there hunting for me. None of the Beetons or others elsewhere would give them my address - they had been to 4 other families - But Br' Squire not knowing them, gave my address and they left his house at 3 o'clock at 20 minutes walk from my room. I did not leave my room this day from 11 past 9 AM, where I returned from breakfast, until 11 past 5 - I cannot imagine why they did not find me - but they did not. After a few moments Br' Junod came in to Br' Squire - he appeared much excited - said the women would be the death of him - that they were eternally singing in his ears that he was crazy and that they gave him no rest night or day - I tried to console him and spoke peace to him - but after a while he burst into tears and cried with all his force - I called quick on Br' Squire who is an Elder and laid hands upon Br' Junod - he became more calm - ceased weeping, but remained dumb and sombre - and soon after left shaking hands with us all around. I went with him to his house and there returned and spent the evening at Br' Squire's - I wrote out today the list of the members of the church.

Thursday  
10

Rain

Started off this morning to go to the Commissaire of Police at the faubourg St Antoine - I arrived there at 14 past 10 - saw the Commissary, who appears a busy man - from thence I called on Br' Bargat and spent half an hour there - went to Br' Flominon's and ate dinner and at 2 left and went to Br' Huber's where I met Br' & Sister Fontenau in deep distress. Her brother had been coaxed into a carriage with the idea that his wife was going to Saint Omer to be baptised - but they took him to the mad house - The 3 women above named had been at Sister Fontenau's and beat her for speaking to her brother on the subject of religion - She was in almost as bad a state as her brother - However, I soon brought her out of that and finally made her laugh - and be happy and forget her unholiness in the glories of the promises of God.

She has had a hard siege of it for several months - Br' Fontenau is a calm composed quiet spirited man, but without he has a most uncompliable resolution - All this has made him suffer much - but Br' Junod is not as he has been 5 times before when he was mad before - he was terrible - he wanted to kill all his relations; art could not be controlled - but now he is quiet & inoffensive only he does not speak to any one -

Spent the evening with Br' Vale who is recovering his health & one of the collegues - a very learned man - too learned - called this morning and agreed to be baptised - I have appointed Sunday week (20 June) - I fear for him, he has been dabbling in all kinds of mysticism - magnetism, Debilism, Protestantism - and other civilistisms - so much so that he

will find it hard work to humble himself down to the simple truths of the gospel of Jesus Christ. May God help him. Spent the afternoon at Brother Fontenear's. Took dinner with them - Br' Fontenear used to see Br' Junod. He is quite calm - and hopes soon to be out again. Br' Fontenear & wife keep a good heart knowing he is in the hands of the Lord and that all will come around right. Had a very full meeting - In spite of all I could do the Spirit forced me on to the subject of the Valley a number of times. Every time I quit it I would have to come right back on to it again. All were well pleased - a good many strangers present. I noticed some men who were delighted with many does I threw out.

Wrote to Elder Samuel W Richards president of the British Isles relative to debts here in Paris - Br' Squire tells me that some of the brethren grumble desparately about being called upon to give means for my support - In fact as yet I have rec'd little or nothing from them towards my support - Sister Squire is very complaining, they think she has the consumption - She is perfectly resigned to the will of the Lord - thanks the Lord with all her soul that she has received and obeyed the gospel and commenced the work of attaining a celestial glory - A better saint, wife, mother, daughter, sister and friend cannot be found this side of heaven - She has treated me as a sister would an only brother during the whole time I was with them and fit it in the name of a prophet and surely she shall have a prophet's reward -

Her husband is also perfectly resigned -

Dreamed of splitting out a tooth in 2 pieces, a little piece had to find and a very long piece which was a mere shell - this tooth appeared to break off from a place where I have none in my upper jaw beside the eye tooth. It has been so cold for about a week past that the women have had to use their footstoves and use their boas and muffs - I am now draped in all my winter clothes, the same as last January and my feet are aching - There was certainly frost in the air for two or three nights past - very windy and heavy rain 12 times in 24 hours. (The dream I take to mean Ellen & Charley) I had to have fire it is so cold - I built it this morning and have had to keep it up all day

Elder Denhouse arrived this evening at 5 from Geneva - Elder Lorenzo Snow left him president of the Foreign Mission - I was glad enough to see him -

Rec'd a note from Lorraine, Commissary of the police asking for my papers to prove myself a Frenchman or a naturalized citizen without which I am forbidden by law to preach. This is only a mean, sneaking chicanery or trick for when I wrote out my declaration of holding a meeting. I expressly stated that I was a stranger.

I did not sleep an hour last night although exceedingly fatigued in the day. But the commissaire letter acted like a strong

 Started with Elder Stenhouse and went to St Omer calling on the way for Br' Thobister Squire. We met on the island a number of the members of the church - and two persons desiring baptism. Madame Vales et Mr Lalair - who have asked baptism of me and I don't feel as if I had a right to refuse. We went over to the little made island supporting one end of the mill - and after exhortation, pray & covenant I baptized them in the Seine. We then retired to dinner - some drank too freely - I have had my eye on them before to day. We then went away down the river towards St Denis and finding a convenient place we seated ourselves and Elder Stenhouse spoke for 2 hours. and wound up by exhorting them to feed and clothe Br' Bolton. Elder Bolton then arose and after a few words of consultation proposed that Br' Theodore Auguste Muller be ordained an Elder in this church - seconded and carried unanimously. He was then ordained under the hands of Elders Bolton, Stenhouse & Squires. Mr Lalair having asked several times for permission to speak. I then told him he might, but only one or two words. He then commenced a deal of impudence against Br' Stenhouse and I then told him he had said enough. Some of the Brethren took this in mortal dredgeon - calling me a tyrant. Br' Vales for one and some one or two bad spirited women. But as just at that same moment a very heavy shower commenced they all scuttled off in a hurray and ran towards the ferry for shelter. During the time we were laying on hands on Br' Muller and that Mr Lalair was talking his stupid folly - a police officer in disguise was standing close to us - he followed me and questioned me very close all the way to the boat and then watched us until we got on shore on the other side.  
 Rec'd 25 £ from Samuel Richards towards the debt to Mr Duloux  
 Br' Stenhouse left at 8 AM for Havre - posted a letter for him from his wife, at 10. Directed to Mrs Thomas's Care, St Hampton  
 I then went to la Liseau the Committee of the Quarter where I held my meetings. He and his orders were preceptuary to shut the door of the meetings - but after considerable talk referred me to Mr Parfée Clerk of the Prefet. I then went to see Mr Duloux who gave me good advice and I then called upon Parfée whence I found rough and bearish he was insolent粗鲁 and snappish. I told him it was my principle to bear a great deal before I turned upon my persecutors - that I made this demand in the name of an American citizen - and exactly because I was an American

citizen - and then referred him to the case of Jules Lemoir  
exactly parallel to mine - which was tried before the "Conseil  
de Cézapon" - the highest tribunal; which decided that a stranger  
had a right to hold meetings for religious purposes. I told  
him I claimed this as my legal right according to the laws of  
France - he seemed astonished at my boldness, and it made him  
raise his large big head and open his eyes and look at me.  
for I told him I was preparing to use strenuous measures  
if I was refused - for I shant appeal for protection to any  
unhappy doctor - and proceed to extremities - I told him I hated  
it - but if I must I must - Gave notice to the Law Lord  
that I am to leave his house at the end of the month, as the  
Brethren are to furnish me a room, they having all voted for it on  
Sunday last. As it will save me 15 francs a month.

Tuesday 22 After consulting with Elie Bertrand I have engaged Mr Ange  
to aid me with the "Étoile" for 3 or 4 days. It is the same who  
aided me with the Book of Mormon. He begins tomorrow.

Wednesday 23 Mr Ange spent the day with me preparing an article for  
the Étoile. Mr Bertrand Miss <sup>1/2</sup> Ruesch spent  
an hour at my room. Dr Ruesch tells me that Dr Valis  
and Mr Lalaisse are furious about the affair of Sunday, as also  
Madame Valis. I spent the evening with Dr Squire.

Sabbath 27 Mr Ange wrote 3 days with me - and I paid him 12 francs  
I then took his work to Dr Bertrand who took it home with  
him and read it over. And wrote me a note saying Mr Ange's  
work was not fit to print, begging me to take his council for it  
because I had taken my own lead that I had alienated  
the hearts of the brethren from me - A few moments  
after I read the note he came in - I asked him what he  
meant - I asked him to name one single instance wherein  
he had counseled me and I had not taken his council  
he acknowledged he could not.

29 Tuesday I went visiting among the brethren today and found to  
my utter astonishment that my counsellor Dr Bertrand  
has for a long while been seeking to destroy my influence  
and have himself chosen in my place (poor fool) The  
Brotherhood did not like to tell me of it - but a sister told me  
of it this afternoon - No wonder I can't get permission to  
preach in public - No wonder the brethren kick at advice  
given by Dr Stanhouse - where my counsellor a high priest  
teaches them to despise me - but thank God - I am  
beloved most dearly by nearly all - yet to the death -  
But a few of those lately baptised who came forward as  
now lame only because they were promised to be taken up  
and sent to the Valley at the expense of the Church - they  
say every thing but their prayers - And I shall have  
to cut them off from the Church - till they come in  
right and honest - Mr Lalaisse wants me to administer  
that laying on hands on him - but the spirit says no!  
I took a room to day for the Brethren to furnish to  
same expense -

Spent the day with the saints in the St. Maur quarter  
Dear souls. The trials of the few days past has done them good  
it has increased their love an hundred fold and strengthened their  
faith. I will make honorable mention of Huber & family  
Foubureau & family. Bentz & family. French, Dubois  
Madame Bandelin & her husband. There are to take a room  
and have given orders to a cabinet vendor to furnish it complete  
for me. he to wait for his pay - and receive it little by little.  
May God's Eternal blessing rest upon them.

Br<sup>r</sup> Bertrand has returned me Mr<sup>r</sup> Auger's work uncorrected saying  
he has no time to correct it.

I received a letter of invitation to day to visit the saints  
at Jersey on the 21<sup>st</sup> so I have told the saints not to take  
a room until I return. As if I can straiten out the church  
here I will go to their pastor at Jersey -

Held a council meeting this evening wherein Elder Squire showed  
out what was in him and shew'd a most ambitious, mistrustful,  
overbearing spirit. I had hard work to keep down the revolting  
spirits of which the room was full - but after a great deal of  
preaching to, we separated in a much better spirit than when  
we commenced. Squire had been running around telling the  
saints my mission was ended - and they must seek me away  
and choose another in my place. And if their choice should  
chance to fall on him he would try to please them. He  
uttered the same sentiment before the council, but in a vaguer  
way and as I had never before mistrusted him it was like a  
stab of thunder upon me one - I replied I was appointed  
to remain here by 4 of the 12 apostles and that remain until  
my mission is ended.

Wrote letters to my wife - Elder Taylor, Mr Vandembrouck  
Elder Hart - Elder Hyde & at Havre - In the evening Elder  
Bertrand called and dined with me and we held a long consultation

burden - which was growing too heavy for me. His occupations are  
such that he has not a moment to give to the Church - & that  
I have been obliged to do his work & mine too.

Wednesday

I have been two evenings with Mr Ducloux preparing a letter for permission to hold meetings in public - gave copy for the 11<sup>th</sup> Stake on Monday. Wrote yesterday to Elder Bertrand to appoint a meeting for Thursday evening as I was expecting to leave on Friday or Saturday.

Thursday  
15

Held a meeting this evening all the old saints present when after considerable talking & preaching to they covenanted to forgive and forget all that was past and look a new life towards each other. Left Paris at 10 Minutes past 9 P.M. per Rail road via Havre for Jersey after 9 hours journey I arrived at Havre at 6 A.M. and went at once to Dr. Hysen. Found him well and happy. As also all the saints except Sister Henrion who is constantly fretting about her husband's conduct. We held 3 meetings today, partaking of the sacrament in the afternoon when they all bore a first rate testimony. The young man & Arnold that I baptised last at Havre on my first visit has grown cold and indifferent.

Wednesday  
19

Spent the day visiting the saints - and some old acquaintances. and on Tuesday I went to Gourway where I met a very learned man who has been the Pope's private secretary and legal to the. He likes our doctrine very much. We had a very long interview with him which was very satisfactory to him. After leaving him we called upon Mr Guste Vil at his chateau. He received us with hospitality and showed us over his domains. Don't mention Vil and their youngest daughter in the garden. We spent a pleasant hour and then returned to Havre.

Wednesday  
21  
Thursday  
22

Left Havre for Steamboat for Caen, the former residence of William the Conqueror of England. Left Caen at 5 P.M. after a tedious ride in diligences at the rate of 4 or 5 miles an hour I arrived at Graville at 9 P.M. Visited various parts of the town until 2 P.M. then got on board the little Steamboat Rose for Jersey where I arrived at about 6 P.M. after a smooth pleasant passage. and proceeded at once to Elder J H Keggs residence in St Helier.

Jersey is a very small island about 37 miles in circumference a bold rocky shore and the sea around it studded with rocks in every direction forming an exceeding dangerous navigation. The soil for the most part is beautiful richer than that of France or England. The climate temperate no severe freezing weather. Cranberries winter in the open garden. Left at Elder Keggs' in St Hart's Rd. which room I occupied during all my stay in Jersey. Elder Hart went with me from house to house among the saints, introducing me to them. I spent often week evenings and often 3 times on Sundays.

Monday  
26

Had a feast to day in honor of the noble sons of God the little band of Pioneers who first entered the Valley of the great Salt lake on ~~the 2d July 1837~~ the 2d July 1837. 1163 in number with B. Brigham at their head. It was chosen President of the day with Elder Hart for Vice President. with other officers each in their place. Many of the sisters were dressed in white. At about 10 we met in the large hall and after singing and prayers and a few words from one on occasion we all proceeded to take the carriages which were at the door waiting for us. We were 120 persons in all not counting the drivers. I was placed between the 2 sisters Nancy and Catherine Mallet and Elder Hart in the same carriage with one seat between Sister Soper and Sister Fall. After all were seated my carriage taking the lead we drove entirely around the Island stopping at 1 P.M. at St Omer where the cloth was soon spread on the ground and that was soon covered with the good things of life in great profusion. Wafers being baking & went and found some and brought it to my two daughters & I called these two truly lovely daughters of God - with minds deep and wide & stately and truly dignified deportment. We stopped after partaking of the repast rumble about the rocks visiting the celebrated caves of Plement; it was a windy stormy day but good company made it very

cheerful and pleasant. After a couple of hours spent in this joyous manner I was called upon to break to the great crowd of strangers who had assembled (in French) which I did - we then got into the carriages and rode to Bully Bay a beautiful place. Here we stopped again but it coming on to rain a few drops we entered the carriages again after 1/2 an hour and then rode to Gorey Common where we stopped and took supper and ramble on the Common by the sea side. And then entered the carriages and rode to town where after riding through all the streets in various directions we came to a halt at the door of the Hall where we all entered the Hall and after singing Praise and a few words we separated - after one of the most enchanting days of my eventful life.

Went out to the little fishermen's town of Gorey and held a meeting in the evening Preaching Elder French a noble man of God. And returned to town in the evening with several of the saints more of whom I was yet acquainted with. A Sister Benedict came and met us with a carriage - part got in but I walked with the remainder. It was a beautiful night. All people in Gorey  
Went out to another fishermen's town called Laroque and preach and bore a bold and powerful testimony in favor of Joseph & William for which I was paid with apples, pears, stones, potatoes &c &c &c found afterwards they mistook me for Dr. Henry Horner.  
Elder Hart President of the Channel Islands conference left today for London to prepare to get married on the 24<sup>th</sup> August. His intended is a noble hearted woman - one of the most sensible I have seen for a long while.

Breathed three times to day to large and attentive congregations, a most excellent spirit prevails amongst all the saints here. Every day is to ~~see~~ me a *four de fete*, visiting and receiving visits among the noble headed Sons & Daughters of God in Jersey. Noble people - Started this morning at 7 in the beautiful steamer "Courier" for the Island of Jersey, and after a most delicious passage of 2 hours (30 Miles) I arrived at 9 A.M. and went in search of a Mr. Raddon whom I had seen in Jersey at the pre-arr. Breakfast & Dined with him. Elder Thomas Liey Preaching Elder then called for me and we walked over the town and in the evening there was a baptism & Sister Ann Chandler sang for us. She has the sweetest, most melodious voice I ever heard, and she has it in perfect command. I slept at Mr. Cheminant's who has the liver complaint. He has a little sonette about 10 as near an angel as human nature can be. I found the saints here rather cold in good deeds, but they are a good people. I find this island very unhealthy, few healthy persons, and no fat healthy children. I am much troubled with bronchitis since I arrived at Jersey. Often apparently too hoarse to preach; but do, all the same. Great Conscience who cares, a few years sooner or later. Elder Liey had hand bills stuck up for me to preach Friday evening. The Hall was full and again I bore a faithful and powerful testimony of Joseph & Brigham, to a very attentive congregation.

I went to the race course one day and visited a Druids temple - composed of 29 stones - 23 upright supporting 6

August

6 enormous flat ones. the 1<sup>st</sup> one very large the others smaller and smaller 100000 and there appear to be many more buried in the sand. it is not far from the sea shore on almost the top of a high hill. there is a kind of door way left on one side. it is now 12 by 25 feet on the inside. Tradition says they used to sacrifice beautiful girls here.

Saturday 7 After spending 5 most agreeable days among the saints here I left this morning for Jersey by the "Courier" as I had promised to be at Jersey on Monday to a tea meeting and there would not be a boat again until Tuesday. They were loth to have me leave - begged hard I would stay over Sunday. I told them perhaps I would come again soon. I arrived at Jersey after a most stormy boisterous passage of 2 1/2 hours. but the noble little "Courier" behaved well. a good sea boat.

Sabbath 8 Preached in the afternoon and evening. They let me rest in the morning. Elder Tresseder is the president of St Helier's branch he has 8 children and a most noble woman for a wife. He is a most noble man full of the work the same may be said of Elder Kirby Travelling President of the Conference. and his beautiful wife. The brethren have promised me some new clothes of which I am in great need. having neither boots nor under nor outer cloths fit to be seen. my coat vest pants & boots are ragged.

Tuesday 10 Preached this evening to a very large congregation in the Hall  
Wednesday 11 Went out to Goree as usual and preached and staid all night. 5000 bed bugs. Oh dear. Then Thursday went to Laroque and preached and slept and returned to town Friday morning.

Friday 13 Baptized 3 persons for their health. Sister Quale & 2 others and 1 for the remission of sins. A mob assembled and as we were returning they pelted me with sand and cursed and swore awfully. I paid no attention to them. I felt this time would come soon enough. A great strapping fat old woman followed me all the way into the water. say 1 mile. for I had to walk out that far before I could find depth enough to bathe. Laid on hands. A great many present of the saints it was 10 P.M. when we began to meet at the house of Sister Dupre's a masculine bold unmerciful sectarian woman - wants to gover all creation. her husband is a weak inoffensive patient man. thoroughly henpecked. and used like a dog or worse. They have some first rate daughters. and no son.

Saturday 14 I have frequently been called on to anoint and lay hands on the sick, in fact 3 or 4 after every meeting. If God has heard our prayers. today dear Sister Mary Bowditch lay upon her bed very ill. too feeble to speak much. but after the laying on hands in 1/4 of an hour she arose and did a day's work washing & waiting on people at the Ocean bath house with her mother to her mother's great astonishment Her mother is the true hearer latter day saint if most ever saw. She has a hard row to hoe to

provide for the wants of her children - 7 in number.  
She is constantly slipping money into my hand and pocket -  
May the God of Heaven bless her and her little dear flock  
with every earthly and heavenly blessing. Henri Henrion  
made it his home at her house. Alice Bowditch.

15

Spent a most delightful day. Preached in the morning at Saint Helier  
then went to St John's accompanied by some of the sisters to sing. Sister Sophie  
Mary Bowditch, Anne Dupont and two or 3 Brothers. preached in the after  
noon to a full hall of strangers. Walked into town and preached in the  
evening to a crowded hall. When speaking of the coming of Christ in  
the Alabahouse a woman cried out "desper" in White "yes dasper in white"  
and thus commenced a discourse about poor defenceless creatures but  
was put out. I was very unwell with bronchitis but spoke 2 hours  
Spent a happy walk preaching in town on Tuesday (council on Monday)  
Wednesday at Goree. Thursday at Laroque. And visiting among  
the saints. I will mention the names of Sister Alice Bowditch. Br.  
Gregory. Br. Hambling. Br. Wyatt. Sister Mary Waller & her sister  
Katherine. Sister Fall. Sister Sophie. Br. Linn. Br. Hornov. Br.  
St George who has a most lovely little daughter. Br. Granter. Br. Chatton

Sunday  
22

I received two letters to day one from Paris saying Elder Hart was there  
and one from Sam'l W Richards wishing to see me in London immediately  
and I received another from Elder Hart inviting me to his wedding on  
the 2d and desiring me to send Henri Henrion to accompany Elder  
Hart once to Switzerland. Being so ragged I hated to appear in  
London at a wedding - but feeling in my spirit that there was some  
thing wrong about Elder Hart going to Paris where I knew a  
Devilish spirit was raging. I suspected he had only been sent as  
a spy. So although revolting to my feelings to see such mean  
underhanded work. yet I determined to start at once to meet my  
accusers if any. knowing before God I was innocent of any act  
that was wrong in the sight of God Angels and holy men.

So off I started  
Gay & light hearted  
To meet my accusers "in face"  
For right well I knew  
That the honest & true

God loves and protects to the best.

Although full of care and affliction and sorrow yet I preached three  
times to day. Once in the morning at St Helier. Then walked 7 miles  
to St Lawrence and preached to about 400 people out of doors. a quiet  
attentive congregation. Then walked eight miles to St Bowditch to tea  
with Sister Sophie to cheer me up a little - then 1 mile more to the  
Hall at St Helier and preached 2 hours in the evening - bid the  
friends adieu for a few days - they gave me money for my passage  
and kept me till near 12 o'clock blessing and laying on hands on  
the sick.

Monday  
23

Started at 7 precisely (in the morning) from the dock and after a  
most delightful passage, the sea smooth as a mirror, we arrived  
at St. Hampton at 6. Went immediately to Br. Thomas - but he  
was out. I then went to the Rail Road and at 9 arrived  
in London. went to Seven Street. met Elder Stanhouse -

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August -

with

went with him to see Bro' Captain Shapley - a splendid man spent ½ an hour there retired to Bro' Henry with Elder Stanhouse to sleep. Bro' Henry is a lawyer - Elder Stanhouse had much consultation without the French & Swiss missions, the position of the saints in Paris with regard to myself. Elder Hart's conduct in going to Paris at a day - without writing me a word about it, the conduct of David W Richards & D. Richards (Lori) The lasting and bitter misery of this last to me because I have quack doctors - who for every disease give Camphine Jupier & Lobelia of which number held one and one of the most ignorant. The night was far advanced before we fell asleep.

Tuesday  
24

Rose early and after a hasty breakfast bid Elder Stanhouse good morning for in consequence of Elder Hart's late conduct he would not go to his meeting. After getting lost in searching an omnibus I found one & proceeded to Elder Hart's, but arrived too late to go with them to the Church of England to see them excommunicated. At about 12 they returned. I then told David W Richards if he had anything to say to me I would ask Elder Hart for a private room and we would go with those persons he wanted. So I asked & said We Lori Richards Elder Hart & myself went into an upper room. I then asked David what he had to say. He said he had received two letters from Elder Bertrand about my conduct in Paris. What is it said I. thank God they can't say anything about my character I yes he does said he. & then commenced reading a letter written by Elder Bertrand full of the most vile low accusations. I was horrified. Said I. Bro' Richards before God, Angels and Holy men I declare that not one of these is true even in part except that I did run about and jump over a pile of hay chased by a sister another sister and a brother present and full of play too. And also the children of the one who chased me were present and I played with them the same. Our conference lasted for 2 hours when it was decided Elder Hart return to Paris with me as I had intended months ago. and we in settling things right in Paris.

I felt sorely grieved at the unrighteous conduct of David W. I would not have acted in the way he did. And I believe that if he acts in this unrighteous manner much more God will remove him and give another his authority. It is not godlike to act in a mean low cunning underhanded way. He should have frankly sent me copies of those letters upon receiving them and asked me about their content. He certainly had not the discerning of spirits or he would have detected the lying, jealous, aspiring spirit of the letter. He forgot to pray. He said I must not expect nor should I have any pecuniary aid from England, but the church in Paris must support me. And advised that I cease the publication of the "L'oeuvre du Deseret" if it would prevent other work by continuing it. How hard it is for a man to judge of the circumstances of a libation of another when he has never been in like.

I am satisfied with every thing I have done and very believe God is pleased with me also. Left Elder Hart at 5 P.M. & returned to 35 Devon St. and met Elder Stanhouse and again slept with him at Bro' Henry's after spending an hour in the evening at Cafe Shapley.

25  
Wednesday

Elder Stanhouse left at 7 for Paris. I received much consolation from his conversation and prayers. God bless him. He and God have alone stood my firm friends since Elder Taylor left. God knows what I have suffered for want of means to carry on the work here. I walked with him to the station; returned alone to Lewin's & took breakfast and walked to Clarendon Square to see the dear little Pet I had in Paris many years ago. Bowdoin. But she had gone home to her mother in Torrington. She has the consumption they say but I don't believe it. From thence I went to Elder Wardens President of London. Met J Hyde Dent there spent a delightful afternoon. Returned to town and spent the evening at Staymer's at 7<sup>o</sup> past 11 P.M. I left to go to Duke's lodgings. Mr. Richards refusing to let me sleep with him unless there would be abundance of room it being the same bed where B<sup>o</sup> Stanhouse & I had slept 2 nights. I felt queer at being alone in London at 7<sup>o</sup> past 11 at night hunting lodgings. After hunting about an hour I found a respectable place and slept sound as a top.

Saturday  
28

Dined with Sister Listerland - her husband is on a mission to Dublin. Called on Sister Jordan - met Elder Hyde there. Spent the Evening with Capt. Staymer. Spent the day with Fred Pursey - Went to a warm swimming bath. Went to day to the Wedding of B<sup>o</sup> Geary - to the sister of Sister Jordan accompanied by Elder Hyde Dent and Sister Jordan. After the ceremony at the church near London bridge we went per Rail Road to Lyons End and spent the afternoon and evening. Spent the evening in the garden I gave enough time. Saw fireworks - dancing - Supposed he a Gipsy told me I am to have 14 children. When Mrs. Hyde and Sister Jordan & I returned to town we met Sister Jordan's Husband who acted like a devil worse than the worst brute to her. He has evidently negro blood in him and is covered with a loathsome disease. Rec'd a letter from Elder Stanhouse <sup>or Mrs.</sup> for Elizabeth White of St. Hampton inviting me to her Sister Lucy's wedding on Monday near St. Hampton to a B<sup>o</sup> Light.

Sunday  
29

Left London at 10 A.M. taking a through ticket for Jersey. As I did not feel to stop & preach in London. Arrived at 1 at St. Hampton went to B<sup>o</sup> Thomas & dined. As I arrived at the house B<sup>o</sup> Thomas said Sister Elizabeth had left not 3 minutes before to go by Rail Road about 8 miles to her sisters. I was vexed at losing such good company. At 2 Elder T & I walked slowly to meeting - Judge my astonishment and felicity. I met Elizabeth near the chapel something had whispered to her to not start by the rail road. It was a joyous meeting of old and loved acquaintances. I love her and her sister as my own flesh & blood and believe they love me the same. I preached and after meeting went with Elizabeth and Supper at her brother's. Preached again in the evening and started after meeting in company with Elizabeth B<sup>o</sup> Budge and Sister Good to walk out 8 miles to where Lucy resided. About 1/2 way we met Lucy and B<sup>o</sup> light. and their joyously continued on and after a walk as delightful and happy as pure love could make it we arrived about 1 A.M. at the Home of Lucy. We partook of a delicious supper and retired to rest. happy gay and light headed.

Monday

Arose early and after a good breakfast and all was in readiness we all started and walked two and two arm in arm to the church where we arrived at 11. I gave Lucy away. After the ceremony we returned in the same way singing the songs of Zion. I remained until 7 in the evening when having for hours been oppressed by the Spirit, to proceed on my journey I bid them farewell laying my hands on the heads of Bro<sup>t</sup> & Sister Light and blessing them. They did all they could to detain me but seeing me unhappy at it they consented to let me come away.

They then accompanied me part of the way. And I bid them a Deau for a short season to meet again on the road the coming year. It was a beautiful night. I arrived in town at 1/2 past 9. Got my budget went and laid hands on the sick & at 11 left in the Courier steamer for Jersey. Got a birth and slept like a top. A very rough night after 1 o'clock. every body sea sick. So the steward told me in the morning.

Tuesday  
31

Arose about 7. Weather somewhat windy & wet. at 9 arrived at Guernsey. Stopped and took in passengers & put out some as usual. A few moments after starting the weather cleared. I went to walk on deck - saw a young woman smile to me - thought she was very impudent. turned and walked away. but upon walking back I noticed she smiled pleasantly again. So I went up to her and asked her if she knew me - Yes - what's your name - Bro<sup>t</sup> Bolborn - Oh all right - what's your name - Sister Mary Ann Williams of Guernsey I had seen her but for a few moments at Sister Smith's in Guernsey one day. She was just on the eve of being sea sick. So I made her take my arm and we walked the deck until we arrived at Jersey at 12 M. Took her to her Aunt Le Motte Ray & went to Bro<sup>t</sup> Hamlin's to dinner. And then commenced my round of happiness visiting among the most excellent people. Preached in the Hall. not many present.

September

Went to home where they received me with open arms. and gave me a new pair of boots - for I was barefoot. Elder Garrison president of Larogue was there to meeting. did not want me to come to Larogue they had been mobbed there the Sunday before. A brother & sister seriously injured and one of the mob most killed and 3 of the mob in prison I was accompanied by Sister William. Mary Bowditch & the happy Elizabeth Wayath & ~~the~~ Jane Romley We visited an ancient fortress which is said to have been an ancient fortress where first visited by the Romans in the days of Caesar and mentioned by them as such - also visited an ancient Druidical ruin which originally had several rooms. And returned to town in the evening lost our way and walked 3 miles too far - thus ended another joyful day.

Thursday  
2

Testimony meeting as usual in the Hall this evening - so I had to preach. Spent the ~~afternoon~~ evening at Sister Gregories with Mary Mallet my daughter as I call her. Since I have made me a shirt. Elder Greider made me a pair of Pantaloons and a vest. Having determined to spend a few days in Guernsey again I left Jersey at 7 By the Courier (it was always my luck to take that boat which really is singular) and arrived in Guernsey after a calm delightful passage of 2 hours. found almost all the saints sick spent a happy night holding ~~present~~ meetings - 8 had been almost every evening

baptized since my last visit, and some more spending of it.  
15<sup>th</sup> Rained very ill - No eminent no better. Dear little angel  
Elizabeth his daughter well and learning fast. gave her some before  
in writing - Visited much of the Island. went Huckleberrying got about  
9 or 9 Quarts of ripe ripe Yankee blackberries.

Returned again to Jersey of course by the "Carrick". And commenced  
preparations for a grand "tea party" or festival to be held in the  
Hall on Tuesday the 21<sup>st</sup> to raise means for my passage to Paris.

Continued my rounds of pleasure - visiting and preaching -  
A severe storm of Wind and heavy rain - Went through the whole  
of it down to the end of the Pier without an umbrella to meet  
Sister Anna Chandler whom I had invited to come and be with us

at our festival to sing for us a little. The dear soul came  
notwithstanding the raging storm. I hurried her into a coach  
and took her to Sister Mc Bridges. Annie Henriots intended  
Elder Freder being a sailor had made one a new coat and a handsome  
light carriage vest. At 7 o'clock I entered the Hall with Sister Mary Mallett  
and Sister Chandler. I found the Hall nearly full of ~~people~~ the Saints

and some Strangers. 1 Shilling or 2½ Cents was charged for admittance.  
The Hall was decorated with festoons of Evergreen and flowers in  
profusion - and over the stand "Truth is mighty and will prevail" was  
formed of various colored Dahlias extending the whole width of the room  
in letters a foot long. We had chosen 8 beautiful young Sisters of  
from 14 to 20 years of age to bear around the refreshments. They  
were all dressed in white and acte under their President. Many belts  
and there were 8 Young men with white vests and blue ~~rosettes~~<sup>ribbons</sup> of silk  
ribbons to act as chevaliers to the 8 young Sisters. The Sister had blue  
belts and a plain white rose in their bosom. The young men had their  
President. The refreshments were a free will offering from the Saints,  
each one bringing what they could. They consisted of Fruits, cakes of  
very many kinds, and lemonade. I was chosen President for the evening  
Elder Kirby vice President Elder Freder Captain. Three Bishops with  
white rosettes and gold headed Staves maintained order. I had a red  
white and blue rosette made by Sister Fall, as also Elder Kirby's, President  
symbol of the French mission. Measurements of the evening commenced  
with one of the choice songs of Zion sung by the 8 young men  
accompanied by the 8 young Sisters. Then prayer by the Chaplain.  
Then songs by Sister Chandler. Mary Mallett. Dr. Price & his two daughters  
and several others & singing the psalms with Sister Chandler. These songs  
were interspersed with discourses from several brethren - I told the  
Story of Paddy Doherty or the origin of Margatory, which caused

tremendous roar of laughter. Elder Freder also caused roars of  
laughter he is so full of fun & mirth. We then asked a piece to show  
up sectarian meetings - there were only 5 or 6 of the brethren let  
into the secret. I arose and was going to speak Elder Freder arose  
and contradicted me - to the utter amazement of all the Saints who  
thought he was possessed of a devil - they imagined every mean of  
them that he was pale as death. his hair on end and his eyes flaming  
with unfeigned fire so strong is the power of imagination -  
He was called to order by another and I roared upon him - and  
broke a scene of suspense ensued as can only be witnessed among  
Congregations - Ministers or Noblemen - or devils all the same there

25

only under different names - The saints all rose up upon the bunting horrified with amazement, some wept, some shouted, "Silence". I was pitched out headlong out of the boat and Elder Treacher sat in my place who in his turn was pitched out neck and heels. I then took my place as also all the mischief makers and by a wave of the hand calmed the troubled elements of war & hatred and gave the saints an explanation of what they had witnessed - (some were on the deck running for the Police) - which caused roars of laughter & applause and restored good nature again - And at 11 we separated in a most joyous gay and happy humour - Full of gratitude to God for our evening of innocent amusement.

I received £ 2 Sterling as the proceeds.  
Thursday 23  
After 3 more days of earthly bliss, visiting among the saints I left Jersey today at 10 in the little wee once steamer Rose. As the steamer receded from the Jersey the my mind turned naturally upon France the seat of my mission - More especially upon the situation of the church in Paris - The improbability of getting them all together to instruct them and try to get them into the good road again - my thoughts were most excessively painful to me, to think of men and women forgetting their counsels, full of slandering envied herbs and snails, rejecting the wise counsels of the authorized servant of the most high God, and rising against him and running like mad bulls, blinded headlong to destruction - But knowing with a positive certainty that I myself am all right in the sight of God. My whole trust I put in the Lord that all these troubles will end for the advancement of his kingdom & the good of his church. So that by the time I reached France at Granville I had a cheerful countenance once again. I was 3 hours crossing and lay upon the bows of the boat. it was a dead calm. Upon arriving at the wharf each passenger was taken into the cabine one after the other and searched most rigorously, even to the lining of my hat and etc. I was too late for the stage at 2 owing to the vexatious delays of custom house officers and pap port police - So I had to wait until 3 A.M. Saturday 25  
I then took diligence to Caen where I arrived at 6 P.M. and slept and started at 7 next morning in a fine steamer for Havre. We had a very rough passage - and arrived at Havre at 12 M. An incident occurred which shew'd to me the immensely wide difference that exists between the church of Jesus Christ of latter day saints and the church of Rome. There was an elderly decent old woman on board who became very sea sick - I pitied her for she appeared to be alone and her countenance denoted great sorrow. I took a seat near her and tried to divert her attention from the movement of the vessel. She told me that deep affliction and misfortune had driven her from her once comfortable home - And she was now on her way to Havre in search of work as she could

not bear the thoughts of being a servant where she was once rich.  
She said she had no money nor no friends or acquaintances nor  
no letters as she had not told any one of her determination. I  
asked her if she was a Roman Catholic. She said Yes - I asked her  
if the world allow me to speak to a Priest then was on board in her  
behalf. "Ah" said she "its we are". Well said I it can at most do  
no harm. She after some time consented. Then the Shepherd of  
the flock who should have been a father to the widow and fatherly  
made all kinds of foolish apologies. He did not know the Person -  
had not many acquaintances in Haarz or the Hague - and turned abruptly  
away. Had it not been for the extreme poverty of the saints  
in Haarz I would have taken her to some one of them but as  
it was I blessed her and left in the hands of the Lord.  
Elder John Hyde Jr. was on the dock waiting for me - and  
we went to his lodgings at Sister Henruds. Poor Sister Henruds  
full of a desponding spirit that would not listen to consolation but  
mugged her imaginary troubles to her heart and refused to be  
comforted. Her husband has decided to send all the children to  
the valley, and would send her too, but she says he won't though he has  
offered it - but the day he would he won't he won't and weeps about it.  
She has a mistress by whom he has had two children.

Elder James H Hart had left this morning at 7<sup>th</sup> for Paris, and as  
I wanted him to spend a few days there before me to try to see what  
he could do - I wrote to him to let him know I was at Haarz  
and would wait until I heard from him.  
3 first rate meetings today. Partook of the sacrament. Mr Deakard  
came in - he has a bad spirit - full of fault finding and doubts and  
fears and full of evil speaking - After the evening meeting we  
held a priesthood meeting and forbid him going among the saints  
as he had no certificate we would not consider him a member  
of the church - He took it all very kindly and promised he  
would not - ever plead with what we had done in silencing him  
said if we had not done it we should not have done our duty - he - it  
was a proof to him of the truth of the work of the church -

1 October

I received a very good letter from Elder Hart so after a week, nearly spent  
pleasantly among the most excellent loving saints of Haarz I left there  
this morning at 7<sup>th</sup> on Rail road for Paris where I arrived at 11 past  
1<sup>st</sup> and proceeded at once to Elder Squires - He heard my step and looked  
out the window and in wife also. I gave him a joyous smile of recognition  
and shook my hand to him all which he did not return but Elder Hart  
says he turned pale and was struck dumb - which abridged Elder Hart.  
I ran up to the room 3<sup>rd</sup> story and gave them a cordial shake of the  
hand - then after grasping & squeezing an hour with them I went to  
see Mr Deakard. He was most glad to see me and his children smothered  
me with kisses. At 10 P.M. I started out and found a hotel to  
sleep at - slept sound - Breakfast at the old place where I spent 2  
happy hours with the little Eugene on my knee hugging & kissing me  
I then went to Elder Squires where I met Elder Hart and after a  
little Elder Bertrand. It found he and Elder Squires were as full  
of the spirit as an egg of meat - Willie as affectionate as ever

1852  
September

and Sister Squire as kind as ever - but acting under great restraint. I went to walk with Elder Hart and talked very plain to him about his conduct in accepting the mean sneaking advice of a Spy from a Person who had no authority over him. That he ought to have had more care for my feelings & the I forgave him but warned him as he loved his salvation never to put himself in a false position again for nobody. I told him of a letter I had once received warning me against him some 3 months ago - that I read but a few sentences of it detected the foul spirit of it and burned it without reading further or knowing who wrote it. That was my way of doing business. For I was sure it was only a trick of the devil to breed ill feeling between him and I. He was astonished. And then told me the history of the man whom he supposed wrote it as he has done similar things before. He felt most humiliistically the difference between my course of conduct and his. After thus getting him right I then went quietly to work with mildness love and calmness to try to save my little flock at Paris. My soul was bound out in prayer for them. I felt to die for them if necessary. I felt to forgive them all their evildoings and follies. In all I did I was admirably seconded by Elder Hart. We called a council of all the male members this evening. I preached to them and then Elder Hart said a few words. And then I called on all to speak. Elder Squire spoke a little. They had all covenanted all the sisters also - to forget the past and sustain and maintain me and listen to my counsels. They all however sat still and did not bear testimony. I slept at a Hotel near Br<sup>o</sup> Squires.

Sunday  
3  
Madame Bentz took me to look at a room - too small for a dog. I found one after a tiresome search at 36 ~~Chapelle~~ Rue de l'Échiquier - and moved into it with Elder Hart. I compelled Br<sup>o</sup> & Sister Fontenay to meet me at Br<sup>o</sup> Hubert to shake hands & forgive. Also told Elder Bertrand to meet me there. Hubert and his wife refused to give the hand to Br<sup>o</sup> & Sister Fontenay - although Elder Hart and Bertrand did our utmost for near an hour and a half. Br<sup>o</sup> & Sister Fontenay were in the garden close at hand waiting. But a heavy rain storm obliged them to return home for shelter - or I would then have cut off Hubert - who said he did not care for the church. he could serve God as well in another church. So I then took Elder Hart and Bertrand alone and talked over Elder Bertrands conduct - pointed out to him the dangerous ground he stood upon. and the childishness of his conduct - I treated him with a loving, forgiving, mild, amiable way so as to save him if possible. Then when he was about right I called in Hubert & his wife. When before these two elders I made Hubert acknowledge that all the foolish language he had said against me were only hear say. Then I made his wife acknowledge that nothing whatever innocent had ever been said by her between Sister Fontenay and myself, only that I was very playful and thus

lowered my dignity as she thought - but that our play was innocent and decent - merely chasing each other and playing also with the children in presence of Madame Hubert and Dr Charles Rubin and Hubert & B.<sup>r</sup> Fontenear's children - Elder Bertrand was quite dumb with astonishment for it was these very people who had started the whole of the talk about me - and it was from their report he had written his letters to Sam W. Richards - He then tried to turn it onto Charles Rubin - But just as we were leaving and had got out of the gate we met Charles - who declared just and it was only innocent play - Not a tenth part as much as he had played at the same time - And that he never had said a word other than that - that he did not want other folks to shoulder their lies on to him.

This just on the cap shore and knocked down all Bertrand's scantling he had attempted to build upon - He acknowledge whilst - We then demanded in justice to me that he write a letter to Liverpool contradicting his former statement which he agreed to do -

Spent the past week trying to win back the saints to their first love - Elder Woodard arrived from Switzerland on his way to London - he spent 2 days with us visiting the saints and bearing a faithful testimony - but he spoke to dull ears After consulting together we decided to suspend the whole church and only receive them by a rebaptism -

B.<sup>r</sup> Fontenear & wife agreed instantly as soon as it was proposed to them - After 2 days trying we got Elder Squire to consent - and then Elder Bertrand consented - And as Elder Bertrand could only go Sunday afternoon - we all agreed to meet them - Elder Hart & I then went down the river to hunt a place as the very name of St Omer was displeasing to me - We found one at Asnières about 5 minutes ride per Rail Road from Paris - a very small unrequested island covered with bushes - So at half 6 this evening we met at the Rail Road office - myself Elders Hart, Bertrand, Squires, Deacon Fontenear & wife and Sister Squires - I then baptised them about 10 past 8 and at 10 to 10 were back in town again happy as crickets - in full joy and fellowship one with another - B.<sup>r</sup> & S<sup>r</sup> Fontenear & Sister Squires need not leave gone but I thought it best to make no exceptions -

We all met this evening at B.<sup>r</sup> Fontenear where Elder Hart assisted me in laying on hands on the rebaptized and they all felt first rate - Elder Bertrand had the letter contradicting his former statements written out and signed and it was then signed by Elders Hart & Squires and B.<sup>r</sup> Fontenear - Sister Fontenear wept like a child when she heard what Elder Bertrand had done - For it was the first time she had heard of all this - We left her weeping bitterly - seeing that all this had come upon me because of her

but she was wrong and so I told her God had permitted  
for a sever upon the church in Paris  
Here is Elder Bertrand's letter.

Paris October 10 1852

Dear Elder Samuel W Richards

I feel it my duty to contradict certain  
statements made by me in two letters I wrote to you on the  
11 & 25 July in reference to my President Elder Bolton

While all Paris is in motion to meet and to greet Louis Napoleon as Emperor of France I am sitting cosily in my little retired 10 x 12 Room away from the street - as snug as a mouse - with a snug little fire - for it's a cold day. My thoughts naturally turn to the passing events. I think upon the mutability of all terrestrial things. But a few months have rolled by and Paris was all in arms against this very man with all the vile epithets possible against him and the world was filled with horror at the tales about the uncalled for and universal curse were hurled at the head who planned it. But in a few short months what a change - These stories have sunk into oblivion - And that same man is received with such demonstrations in the streets of Paris as this people never awarded to their most famous kings - Fickle fortune - Fickle minded world - Who would native - for so I have a right to judge them upon reading their history since 1789. But they have got a man now who knows how to turn them around his thumb and it's to be hoped he will make something of them yet - if so - it's more than any one else has been able to do. Succot to him, say 5. 4 long life if he will only give us liberty to preach in publick the everlasting gospel of salvation - Waller on the Boulevards with Elder Squire and wife and Madame Dugay an elderly widow who used to live in the next room to Mr Squire - We saw 5 triumphal arches made of painted cloth and several paper crowns hung in the middle of the street - it was night and the effect was very pleasing.

Had an attack of bowell complaint with severe gripings - which commenced about 6. Young Babysbra called at 9. Breakfasted at B's<sup>o</sup> Fontenearu - Dined with B's<sup>o</sup> Squire on rice - Had a delightful little meeting in the evening - We partook of the sacrament - and all bore testimony - Elder Bertrand then proposed that B's<sup>o</sup> Fontenearu be ordained an Elder and made some beautiful remarks - I seconded it and made a few remarks carries unanimously - He was then ordained under the hands of myself Elder Bertrand & Squire - We then separated full of love and joy - It's a very long while since we had taken the sacrament together

Elder Bertrand brought the letter he had written for the President I am to write it out first rate - it's a good letter.

Had the pleasure of an interview with Mr S G Goodrich "Peter Parley" as he calls himself in his writings. He is a formal, pedantic, old maidish man - with high veneration high self esteem - animal propensities small - Not a pleasant man signed a power of attorney before him in favor of Mr Charles S Henry of Savannah - empowering him to settle up the old Estate of my grandfather which he left to us children - giving my mother the use of it for life.

8 Days - Also I ached greatly very few kind nurse - but Civilized society required that she leave me - as it would not appear well for her to be in my room and I able to be about. So I bid her farewell with tears and blessings.

My kind hearted old motherly landlady came early this morning while I was yet in bed to see how I was. I told her my fears - so she went away saying nothing and a few moments after the water came up with an injection - which opened my bowels and gave me a copious stool - Yet my appetite gets no better.

Elder Squire came and spent the evening with me and set a grate for me, to save fuel. He is perfect at it. He brought me letters from my wife. Yours & 5% Heart. all good - 5 £ 17 S. Jan 2<sup>nd</sup> 100

wrote to my brother Jackson N.Y. about Post property - To Henri Henrion about a ring. To J W Richards about Vanlambrouck's bank money. To your wife Henrion. To J Hyde Jr. To Stanhouse. 6% Heart - The Lies -

Read meeting in my room this afternoon being yet confined to the room. No partook of the sacrament, they all bore testimony - I spoke awhile and it was a delightful little quiet meeting.

The bulls have been unusually ringing to day. They tell me the shops were almost all closed and the day is kept holy most rigidly - All saints day.

Several persons called upon me. It has rained nearly every day the past week. Oh how I do long to see & feel the influences of a bright sunshiny day - I remain still weak and suffering no appetite - Rec'd to day 6 15.11.7 from David Richards \$300.00 of Mr Van Lambrouck to be paid into the "Banque Paternelle" for Matilda. Don't lends it to me and I am to give him my note for it payable when I arrive at the Valley. Mr Vanlambrouck is to pay me back again according to his letter dictated out to me this evening at their Squire - Sacrament, testimony. I preached a little on the necessity of being either more nor less than the pattern given us by Joseph - for laying on hands the 8c. Dr' Butrom had got a notion he ought to blow upon the sick when he laid on hands.

Went to day and cashed the check for 15.11.1 and took it to the bank - but they told me to call in two or three days again - when the papers would be ready. Called upon dear Madame Dugay. Poor dear soul has been very ill ever since I saw her last. I presented her a book of Mormon for her kind rep to me. Mr Baudier calls and I went with him to Mr Borrow to try to get a passage for him to America. His wife went some time ago - with another lady.

I remained quiet in my room translating Joseph's vision for the "Etoile". Oh what glorious beauties are there contained. I see now one every time I take it up. My health is worse again. I am sick again my side pains all over - bowels enraged.

Rec'd a letter from Monsieur Drouet (Amidie) from New York containing the 300 francs Mr Vanlambrouck has left with him to pay the "Banque Paternelle" for Matilda's recovery. If he has neglected doing it - but had taken it with him to America - I will send it to Elder Richards. So much his bark of the 15.14.0 be lent me for Mr Vanlambrouck -

Went to Elder Squire on my way back - beat out - lay & slept for hours I am so weak afraid the least effort is too much for me.

Paid the Banque Paternelle and took two receipts - in full - for Matilda Vanlambrouck -

My health still remains very poor. Went to Elles Dames at 2. Met Elie Bertrand & tried to get him to sell to the church his translation of Divine authority - he wants 200 francs. for about 4 days work - Madame Dupeyron came in about 4. Still very complaining. He showed me the house on the boulevard where Gaston had his infernal machine that killed so many persons - he intended to kill Louis Philippe - but it went off too soon, and the King escaped. Elles Dames brought me two canaries. A present.

Elie Bertrand came this morning and after much persuasion I paid him 50 francs for the Divine authority it is now church property. Met Sister Fox at last at Elles Dames she is a very pretty pleasant amiable girl - round - plump and pretty form - made to be loved and cherished. She is so trusting, so innocent, so fond, so just herself she cannot conceive that another should wilfully lie and deceive. Poor unhappy girl how my heart yearns and is in pain for her. I was with her about 2 hours at Elles Dames and gave her all the good advice I could. and told her I should try to send her to the Valley if I could get the means - I said everything I could imagine to cheer her and to have her see her one friend on earth and one in heaven - who will ever watch over her if she will do right from hence forth. Her case is peculiarly hard - she had left the man and gone to London and obtained work and was doing well - when he wrote for her to come he would marry her. He came he sent her back for her papers and while she was away chose another woman and wrote to Maria she need not come back - but she knows she would not be treated so - she came back and he is married.

Maria came to Elles Dames in a dangerous state. She feared she would destroy herself but she promises faithfully she would not. But wringing her hands in an agony said if it was not for her hope of getting to the valley she would destroy herself. Comment is unnecessary the facts speak more than I can think. Poor vulnerable girl - whose only fault is too warm a heart.

Suspense is so horrid not hearing from him. So I went at 12 and sent an old woman with a note to the house to say how many I am - but the postman said the man was not at home - I have my doubts.  
I sent a commission this morning with the note to try to get it to Liver Fox, but he returned to me with a note written by wife Fox saying she had gone to London with a family - which I don't believe - poor little creature - she has given herself entirely up to vice. The Devil is glad though.  
I received today 34 francs as a present from Rev. Mr. Dideron and Elder Steinhause - for which may God reward them. I wrote to Elder Dideron and Steinhause to thank them. How this trifling sum warms my heart up not because of the money - but because of the kindly spirit which it was sent.

low spirited. says her sister will not listen to her going to the Valley -  
She is extremely anxious to go this year - The rest of the saints are well.

Monday  
21

Called upon Mr. de Marne and had a long talk with him about sending his  
ships to San Diego. and gave him Elder D. W. Richards' name and desire him to  
write to Daniel on this matter. Saw Capt. Lyons & the crew the steamer  
ship Formidable - Capt. Thompson & ship New York. Mr. Barber & many others  
of my old friends. Capt. Lyons showed me a letter he had received from Sarah  
my sister. What a strange feeling to see the hand writing of my only sister  
written within 15 days - I have never heard from her since her marriage  
which took place shortly after I left New York for Liverpool.  
I spent a couple of hours with Sister LeRoy's sister trying to induce her to  
let Sister Julie go to the Valley. left her in a good spirits. Dined with  
them and then we farewell to the saints and at 7 past 8 got on board  
the steamboat "Wander" bound to South Hampton. This steamer is a  
rapid traveller but exceeding steep - consequently very wet - every wave  
washing over her bow before she lifts to it. a dangerous boat - we  
had a rough passage very wet and squally - I went to bed & slept sound

Tuesday  
22

Arrived at 7 at South Hampton (in the morning) and found I must  
wait until tomorrow evening before I can proceed to Jersey so  
I left my trunk to be put on board the Despatch for Jersey and  
determined to go at once to London not liking to stop at S<sup>t</sup> Hampton  
where no good spirit reigns among the saints which makes it unpleasant  
staying among them. Took a pie of bread at Dr<sup>r</sup> Thomas' and at 9  
at M<sup>r</sup> left for London where I arrived at 12 and went at once to  
see Sister Hart. whom I found still very ill - very weak, very nervous.  
Spent several hours most agreeably, Dined with her - walked across  
the floor three & 10 times with her - laid hands on her & blessed her  
and having letters to deliver I went to Portland Place 61 & took tea -  
then went to Kevin Street and saw the Brethren

going to Gibraltar and Dr<sup>r</sup> Gates - Dr<sup>r</sup> Hyde sent me  
from Elder Gates 10 £ 19<sup>s</sup> to be given to Elder Richards being 300  
francs received from Mr. Morris at New York on account of Mr.  
Vanderbrouck. said had let me have 246 francs for Mr. P<sup>r</sup> which  
I promised to repay. I paid that amount to the Central bank  
for Matilda. Called on Dr<sup>r</sup> Bray - Sister Bray still very ill in  
bed. Spent the evening at Dr<sup>r</sup> George's - and at 11 started & went  
to Mr. Staloch and slept - where Sister Hart is living -

Wednesday  
23

Spent the morning until 7 past 11 with Sister Hart - left her  
in good spirits and proceeded to Towne Street 35. saw Dr<sup>r</sup> Levi  
Richards and several other Brethren. Dr<sup>r</sup> J. Hyde just and had  
much talk with him. He hinted he would like to go to the Valley  
but I told him no - go to Calais and fill the mission I had already  
given him. Dined with Dr<sup>r</sup> George - left London at 7 past  
8 for South Hampton - but owing to a very dense fog we left

1852

December

24

Southampton at 3 A.M. having been detained over 3 hours, but I had secured a berth and went to bed at 11 and slept sound until 10 A.M. then arose - sea very heavy - severe storm raged at 12 on a delicious hand - arrived at Jersey at 3. Elder Hart - Liey & Sister Williams were on the dock waiting for me and now commenced a round of baptisms among these excellent saints. Took my trunk to B.<sup>r</sup> Grangers. Called on dear Sister Bowditch found all in excellent health, and a good spirit - Mary was so happy she had not her ring back I wrote to Henry Mervin about who had taken it out of Mary's work box without her permission - you bless Sister Bowditch & her family. Called on Bro<sup>r</sup> Freedee & Herby, and on Mary & Kate <sup>Wade</sup> spent the evening with them very happily.

Friday

25

Called on Elizabeth McBride and obtained the stolen ring and took it to Mary Bowditch - gave Elizabeth much counsel about Henry. Then went to visit the beloved excellent saints at Goree - and their excellent President Farmer - Spent the day and returned on foot to St Helier, very fatigued. Went to Bro<sup>r</sup> Gregory's and being weary I lay down and fell asleep and was delightfully awakened with a kiss, and that from my dear daughter Mary. So I had to pay a pair of gloves - We then took a walk. This has been to me throughout a most joyous day long to be remembered.

Saturday

26

Dined at Sister Hart's with Sister Kate and after dinner went with her to Mary's and spent the evening. Spoke about their going to the Valley this year - told them I would make up what money they were lacking - and that I did so out of the purest brotherly love and with no ulterior object. And they shoule go free as air, and what I gave them shoule be a gift of friendship. I only desired their happiness - and considered it beneath an Elder in Israel to take advantage of a young woman's desire to get to Zion to purchase her with money by covenant with me - No let them go to the Valley there where they are in Zion free as air they shoule it be their wish to be with me - all right.

We separated at 10 and I went to Br<sup>r</sup> Grangers but could not get in the door was locked - the windows all fast - I had to walk the streets and wait until 1 A.M before they all came home - and I went to bed happy.

Sabbath

27

Held a conference to day preached several times in the Hall in St Helier. Several others preached - the day passed most agreeably every where the work prospered well in these Islands. an excellent spirit reigns - no persecution - preaching called for every where - in two places - many being baptised - 20 or more getting ready to go to Zion - but few weak ones.

I have spent a delightful week visiting among this good people who are full of the holy Ghost, full of faith and good works. Much credit is due to Elder James H. Hart who is presiding over them since Elder John Park left. Elder Freedee is a very just robe man and has a noble wife and a beautiful family of 8 or 9 children. These saints desire to give me some means to go home with - but they are very poor. Elder Park drained them thoroughly when he was leaving. Elder Freedee says the

Saturday

1 January

1853

January

Saints raised for I Pack over 200 £ & stg to his certain knowledge besides what he may have received privately - and the most of the Saints had to borrow the money to give him and have not yet paid that debt - Thus although I am almost naked - no clothes, upper or under - no shoes yet they cannot give me anything scarcely - And I fear Samuel will refuse to aid me as he has always refused - for I now feel not to return to Paris - but to go from here to England and then to the Valley - Elder Hart and Parsons agree that this will be the wisest course.

Monday

3

Took with me Elder Parsons and went on a visit to the Saints at Guernsey. It was a heavy storm - sea very rough - but the Zephath is an excellent sea boat - Sister Williams was with us. She and Br<sup>r</sup> Parsons were very sea sick -

Tuesday

5

After a most agreeable visit I awoke this morning and finding the storm not quite so bad determined to leave at once for Jersey again - awakened Elder John Parsons and sent him to see if the boat we yesterday had passed in the night - he returned in a few minutes saying the boat was in sight and would be in in 1/2 of an hour - I laid hands on Br<sup>r</sup> Clement and blessed him and ordained him an Elder - and bid him farewell - But the Spirit worked strangely about him - I could not bless him although he asked repeatedly for it - and I gave him a mission to Havre some time since - but could not get my hands on his head - strange -

We arrived at the dock just in time and got on board the Steamer and through a fierce storm returned to Jersey. Dear little Angel Elizabeth has worked out a beautiful piece of Crochet work - a dove with its wings spread and an Olive branch in its mouth - its a beautiful thing -

All the brethren & sisters are in good health but Br<sup>r</sup> Clement, he cannot last long he has the consumption - Elder Hart was waiting on the dock for me & we went up in town - I now commenced making preparations for my departure for Pool.

From this time as every day was alike I kept no journal; but during the next 3 weeks I was making all necessary arrangements for the departure of some 20 of the Saints for the Valley - Urging some, Praying for others, providing ways for others to be - I succeeded in getting off Ann DaBresne - a good, lively, laughing young girl, but she has been always since 2 years old, hated, persecuted by her mother who has constantly sought every means to destroy her - and aliened her now from all insurance. I rejoice in being able to send her out of her mothers way. Her mother is a most tyrannical woman. She would allow her husband to enter the house at all - and has endeavored to make him PAY HIS BOARD. They have a comfortable estate worth 1000 £ & stg but she has managed to get it all into her own hands - & they turned him out of doors. He is a quiet, easy, good nature man and a kind hearted father & friend - I have also continued to get the means for the departure of Mary Anne Duper - who has always been a faithful saint. By letters I have been urging off some of the French saints of Havre.

1853

January

More especially have I been urging off Henry Harriod and at length I have received a letter from Eugene saying his father has given Henry - Eugene & Judas & their sister the means to go with to the Valley. Henry has lost my confidence and that of the saints who are acquainted with him. He has not the spirit of the work in his heart - He has gone against counsel continually - and has been led by the nose by Elizabeth Mr. Brice, who has no particle of faith and is no better than him. I shall be glad to send him off for his own salvation.

Monday

24

Elizabeth Wyatt, a dear good girl, after trying for two months to keep up, (her brother died at sea, he was the son of Sister Dorothy) she now had to give up altogether and go to bed. I was called upon to anoint her - found her too weak to sit up - or even raise her hand I remained by her all night, and watched over her, often sitting for sometime with my hand on her head fearing she was dying and I held to her by faith. I taught her some most glorious doctrines relating to the salvation of the husband of her choice altho not really yet married to him - and also doctrines relating to her future line of conduct. She became very cheerful & happy which I hope will operate to her being healed.

Thursday

27

The saints held a tea meeting this evening the illness of Sister Wyatt makes me so uneasy that I cannot take comfort in anything. Her mother seeing me lift Elizabeth out of bed & set her on a box while having the tea made undertook to get her up, she painted and has visited us one since last night & they are thinking to see her every minute now - Mary and I went up and remained there until she appeared about 9 o'clock. We then went to the Tea meeting just in time to hear Elder Hart finish his discourse. Judge of my astonishment, vexation, anger when Henry Harriod came up and offered to give me his hand - I had written to him to proceed immediately from Haven to L'pool & thence to the Valley. And his father had given him the means to do so, but he has abused the confidence of his father. Disregd my council to come back here again - He came here some weeks since and after laying about awhile I advanced him money to replace what he had wasted of that which his father had given him and sent him to L'pool to go with his brothers & sisters to the Valley. But the mean dishonest fellow went to L'pool, and resorted to his destruction by the Devil. Now the rest of the money his father has deposited for him is has returned - I then warned Elizabeth Mr. Brice to not leave anything to say to him or to go with him, not to marry him nor harbour him at her house. Then proceeded to disclose his past history and by an almost unanimous vote he was cut off from the church. I spoke about an hour. & then left & went back to the residence of Elizabeth Wyatt & sat with her all night.

Friday

28

Saturday

29

Elizabeth much better - Sent Dr. Parsons to Guernsey to see after Elder Liez. We started for Steam boat - weather very rough. While quietly seated at tea with Elder Hart - at Hotel St Georges Elder John Parsons came in - and appeared very dejected - Elder Hart by and I then went to walk and met Elder Liez. Elder Parsons then told me that upon arriving at Guernsey the spirit had whispered to him that Liez had committed adultery with Sister

1853  
January

Our Chancellor whom I knew loved him devotedly - I had had some talk with him about her and about his marrying, but he denied there being anything between them. Said he did not wish to marry any wife. Elder Zion at first denied it but when hot pressed he acknowledged his sin - and begged for mercy. Elder Parsons referred him to me - So we went to Dr. Granbury & held a council where it was decided that he marry her or be cut off from the Church. As he was guilty of humiliating a daughter of Israel (I rec'd a letter from Elder Hart soon after this time saying that Zion was cut off by our Chancellor also)

Monday  
31<sup>st</sup>

Having received about 7 pounds  $\text{£}7\text{s}$  from the saints of this conference towards an outfit to the Valley. I bid them all farewell and started in the steamer Courier for St. Hampton in company with a little company of saints. Kate & Mary Mallett, Ann Marsh, Ann Duperre, Mary Ann Sophie and a family of 9 Persons French People. We had a very rough passage the storm was great there being 4 Persons very sea sick - And two or 3 others I had to wait upon them more in their births in the cabin and their being 20 or 25 others in a little cramped up room for cabin the stench was great & it made me sea sick I vomited 3 times - but felt no inconvenience from it. being able to eat between times with appetite & relish - the only time I was ever sea sick in my life. Mary Mallett it well; was not at all sea sick. Kate was some sick. We left Jersey at 7 of P.M. and arrived at St. Hampton at 9 P.M. Went to Miss Thomas's who told us where we would find a hotel. Where we all went took tea and retired.

Tuesday  
February  
1

Having packed the luggage at the Custom house & taken breakfast we left this inhospitable town at 12 and after a great deal of waiting on the part of Sisters Marsh & Sophie we arrived at 4 at London. Went & deposited the luggage at Newton Station for Liverpool & took lodgings at a Hotel opposite. Late & Mary went to their Father's house & I went to the Office in Twin street, where I met Dr. John Brown & 4 or 5 others from the Valley just arrived in England on their way to foreign missions.

Being invited to a tea meeting not far away, I went with Sister Sophie and remained until I past 8 during "the deer" & preached about an hour on the subject "Who is entitled to my wife". The refreshments were delightful and abundant. Several brethren accompanied me back to the R.R. station. There I remained all night. Next morning sent off some of the saints to Liverpool. I went & spent the day with Sister Hart, found her much better. She came down stairs & sat all the afternoon

She invited me to call & bring Kate & Mary to see her ~~on Saturday~~. She's a little this evening from Sister Hale stating the brutal treatment she & Mary has received and were receiving at their father's house. So I called at their father's and told them where I should expect to meet them next day. I then went to an evening meeting where Dr. Brown was preaching. Home to Mr. Hales (Sister Hart) & slept.

Went this morning to Mr. Mallet where I suffered the most violent outrageous conduct I ever experienced. The conduct of the Elder Brother Fredricke towards his sisters was most unnatural. He repeated several times that he would rather his sisters should become whores in the streets of London than that they should go with the moment. The evening at 9 the way a real lesson for it was as dark as it can say it at midnight I could not see my hand close to my nose it lasted so but a few minutes. but

February

The frequently repeated that if it was not for the laws of England he would shoot his sisters and me too. I told him I could play at that game. And that none but the most degraded scoundrel could demean himself so low as to speak in such a manner of his own sisters. & if they had not always conducted themselves with the utmost propriety. There was a moment of expecting him to attack me I rose to my feet and prepared myself & then threw myself on him for his infamal principles & he soon cooled off & sat down. & soon left. I then agreed to meet them ~~tomorrow~~ tomorrow & left & slept at Jersey Street. It was a rough evening as ever I spent.

Thursday

3-

Met Dr Major & several others at meeting this evening near Westminster Abby - I went incognito with Mr Stalon - Slept at Mr Stalon's - who showed me some beautiful work of his carving in oak, especially an Elk's head covered with birds, reptiles, Shrubbery, animals &c.

Friday

4th

Kate, Mary & I spent a most happy day with Sister Hart. It rained hard all day and continuing. I went with K & M to their house and then proceeded to Jersey Street; paid Mr Hill's passage to the Valley. agreed to meet them at Liverpool Having finished up my business I bid farewell to London went to a hotel close to Euston Station and went to bed at 12 M<sup>l</sup> on

Saturday

5

Morn at 6 A M, eat breakfast & started at 7 A M per Rail Road for Liverpool during a most severe snow storm. and after a most fatiguing disagreeable, most uncomfortable journey I arrived at Liverpool at 12 past 7 P.M. took a cab spoke to Jersey Street. saw Elder Richards who directed me to Fowles hotel in Great George Hall street 63 where I immediately went and to my astonishment I met there Ann Dinsmore whom I supposed had died I also met Dr David Spencer, Dr Wheelock, Thirkleff, Isaac Spencer - Dr Houts & others. I had sat but a few moments when Ann March Mary Anne Sophie & her Aunt came in. Mary Anne was etc, formal & strange - I enquired no good from her concert - Then I last set but a few moments & went away & I return to rest.

Sunday

6

Went to the meeting of the saints in Bold street. My astonishment was amazing on meeting there Eugene Curran - Sister Sophie Leroy - Sister Ernestine and her little son all poor slaves. They had missed their passage by the last ship, and meeting me so unexpectedly they were glad they had missed their passage. I told Eugene in very arms for some time, dear boy, how I love him. He asked whether he ought to marry. I said No! positively No!

Monday

7

Spent the day with Eugene. Dined with the March saints. And in the evening spoke to Mr Donald president of the Liverpool conference that I was personally and consequently could not pay my board. So he invited me to his house.

Tuesday

8

Hab & Ellery had written to me to be at the station to meet them this evening, but expected to be pursued by me & their brothers with a visit and I should have to act circumspectly when I met them at the station. They arrived at 12 past 7 and I felt sincere joy in once more taking them by the hand and rejoiced they had escaped thus far poor Babylon.

Spent the day for some days I spent my time with the French saints Went over to Birkenhead & spent a day at Dr Howlands. Made acquaintance with the Bennett family. Joseph the engineer of the ferry boat Queen is a full blood Mormon.

1853

February  
15  
Tuesday

The friends saints left today in the noble ship Elvira Owen with 400 saints for N.O. & thence to the Valley. I laid my hands on the heads of Kate & Mary & blessed them. And after buying for them some few things for food extra I parted from them and they proceeded to sea. God bless them all & protect them from every species of evil and grant they may arrive safe & peaceful in the Valley.

Wednesday

16

I forgot to state that Mary Ann Doper reported of coming to go to the Valley in consequence of her over fondness for her uncle and the day the saints went on board the Elvira Owen the next her uncle to get her trunk from amongst the rest of the luggage. and at 2 o'clock she went with her aunt on board the Elvira Owen to bid the saints farewell who had accompanied her from Derby - in stepping upon the ladder leading between decks her foot slipped & she fell into the hold about 16 feet upon some nail road iron - cutting her head in two places breaking her collar bone - bruising her elbow & injuring her nose and lip. I arrived with the French saints about 15 minutes after. it was a ghastly sight that struck my eye upon walking on the deck of the ship - Mary Ann with her hair hanging every way blood streaming in a steady stream from the wounds in her head - her eyes closed - white as death - without one sign of life. I sprang out took her in my arms, after permission to take her into the cabin but was refused this by getting the brother to remove a nail of trouble & managed to get into the hospital of the ship - where 2 or 3 elders laid on hands & anointed her with oil - and about an hour afterwards her uncle & aunt came with a vehicle & took her home swearing faithfully against the servants or associating with them in any way & caused by forbidding me the house. Mary Ann even at first healed by the power of the brother but allowing herself to be led astray from God - the evil returned upon her and the last time I saw her she appeared going rapidly into a decline. Mary Ann Doper's real name is Brice.

Held a long consultation with Saint W Richards about my return to the valley - but it was finally decided that I remain in Liverpool & neighborhood and shant will send and get means for me to go with to the Valley - and gather it among the conferences for me. So I mentioned to Elder Mc Donald that I wanted to go about among the branches preaching & visiting. So he sent me to Southport where I spent several days most agreeably - and would have staid longer only that it was expecting the next vessel to sail on the 24<sup>th</sup>. but on arriving in Liverpool I found that no vessel could be found at a reasonable price to take the saints to N Orleans. Next Elder David Grant at S<sup>t</sup> Post. Met Elder W<sup>r</sup> Taylor (brother of Elder John Taylor) who is sent on a Mission to Germany. He introduced me to Sister Bell - wife of the Missionary to Malta and Sister Mullenhauer wife of Dr<sup>r</sup> John Taylor's Cousin who is the boss of the sugar business in the Valley. These two sisters live together at Grasmere - Birkenhead. I spent much of my time with them and was treated as a brother. Sister Bell is a most remarkably amiable kind hearted woman - she had been married but a few days when her husband was called off to Malta on a Mission. God bless them. Spent a week at Up Holland among a first rate people. Their president is a first rate young man "Thomas Kerble". Visited some coal pits

1853  
April

but could not be induced to go down a pit. It made a horrible sensation  
to look down the shaft or see any one else look down. Here I remain  
the present of a pair of boots, but far too large for me, but good leather;  
I visited several in the neighborhood - went home through a deep timbered Valley  
to go to a brother's house, crossing many fields partly on a paved old road.  
I found the brethren here very comfortable, having plenty to eat & enough  
around them, they work from 3 & 4 ft to about 14 ft down in the mines  
and when they come up out of the mines they look like real black negroes  
and can scarcely be recognized - but I must acknowledge that I am astonished  
at the comfortable situation & circumstances in which I find the miners  
in this District so different from what I was led to expect by news paper reports  
etc - when at Orrell Post I was but 2 miles from Wigan, but did not  
visit it. There is a branch of about 100 at Up Holland & 100 at Wigan  
Bro. Daniel Darrow who is visiting Manchester and gave me a letter to Liverpool Missions  
who is present there. I visited several branches with him among others  
the branch of Middleton where I preached an evening meeting where they have  
a good brass band who made good music. From thence I went to Hales Bridge  
arriving at about 1 A.M. slept sound. Held a meeting last evening here -  
Very cold snowy weather - could not walk about because of the snow. Left  
Sunday morning for Manchester and proceeded to the great Hall where I  
preached twice that day. The hall was very full. I received \$1.00 as a gift.

Tuesday

Returned to L'pool and made my home with Sister Mullens where  
she helped me purchase a few goods for my wife & pack my trunks
